The Grand Trunk Pacific railway will open on June 26th a new summer hotel that will be among the largest and most modern in Canada. This is the Minaki Inn, a title derived from the Indian word meaning beautiful country. It is situated on the Winnipeg river, 114 miles east of the city of Winnipeg, amid Jelightful scenery.
