

MRS. ROWELL IS ACTIVE

IN THE POLITICAL AFFAIRS OF THE PROVINCE.

Wife of Liberal Leader in Ontario is a Great Help to Him in His Campaigning—An Active Church and Social Worker.

Mrs. N. W. Rowell, wife of the liberal leader in Ontario, has come into considerable prominence throughout the province of Ontario since her husband was called upon to assume the leadership of the provincial opposition. Prior to Mr. Rowell's sudden plunge into active politics, at the urgent request of influential men of his party, Mrs. Rowell was well known to a wide circle of active women workers in Toronto as an active and most useful participant in organized efforts to improve social and educational conditions. Today her reputation as a talented and energetic woman extends pretty well over the province, for she has actively seconded her husband in his crusade against the bar, and has made it her business to interest various women's temperance organizations in it. Mrs. Rowell makes no effort to disguise her personal interest in politics, and although she has not expressed herself definitely on the women's suffrage question, she has shown by actions which speak more eloquently than words, that she believes it to be the duty of women to keep themselves abreast of the times in an intimate knowledge of politics, to form their own opinions thereon, and to make their influence felt in public life by urging their views upon the electors directly and through the medium of their women folk.

Mrs. Rowell took an active interest last December, enlisting the active co-operation of many men and women in different parts of the province on behalf of the candidates of her husband's party, and personally taking an active and even responsible part in the contest in Mr. Rowell's own riding of North Oxford. In this kind of work Mrs. Rowell has the advantage of being not merely a woman of great natural ability, but one of superior education. Her father is the Rev. Dr. Alex. Mac Langford, of Toronto, now superannuated, one of the most learned divines of the Methodist church in Canada, so that in her childhood she was accustomed to an atmosphere of culture and learning. She is, moreover, a graduate in arts of Toronto university, and ever since her graduation she has kept up her reading, and has taken

WELCOME TO ROWELL

BY THE FARMERS OF HIS OWN RIDING.

Conservatives Come Forward and Tell Liberal Leader They Will Vote for His Policy.

Harrington, June 15.—That N. W. Rowell and his platform are both popular in his own riding of North Oxford was demonstrated at the two meetings he addressed Saturday afternoon at this place, which is about twenty miles from Woodstock, and at Lakeside. The public hall was crowded with farmers who had driven in from miles around when the liberal leader took the platform. "The election has not been called to serve any particular public interest," declared Mr. Rowell. "The legislature had one and a half years to run. A new election costs the people a great amount of money. There was brought on now except to simply serve the political fortunes of the conservative party. They thought that they could take us by surprise. They have already discovered their mistake. We have entered this contest with a finer list of candidates than we have ever had in any previous election, and the government is greatly alarmed at the result. They thought they could rush on an election, get the support of the liquor interests and the support of the conservative temperance men, but all over the province men are breaking from party lines and lining up in support of abolishing the bar.

GREAT DUELIST-WOUNDED

Daudet Beaten at Neully by Jacques Roujon.

Paris, June 15.—Leon Daudet, a notorious duelist, was wounded in the forehead in the course of a sword duel at Neully by Jacques Roujon, son of Henry Roujon, the late secretary of the academy of fine arts. Roujon was the challenger, and he fought in defence of the name of his father, whose memory he considered to have been injured by articles which appeared in Daudet's paper, *The Action Francaise*, a Royalist organ.

The encounter took place in private, only the principals and the seconds being present. Reddish brown snakes that drop from trees near Milan, Ohio, have not only baffled amateur naturalists, but ruined a perfectly good lover's lane in the neighborhood. Steve Urban, Lorain, O., admitted that he stole a set of stone steps weighing half a ton "just to be doing something." He was fined \$10.

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"I don't think I have addressed one meeting of this campaign when a conservative has not come to me and said: 'I have voted conservative all my life, but I am going to vote for you and abolish the bar this time.'" Last night one man in Woodstock told me that he had never given a liberal vote before, but that he would do so in this campaign. "Abolish the bar is not the only thing on which I ask your support although that would entitle me to election. We have more things on which to ask your support than we have had in the last twenty years. The government has been growing weaker by integral dissent. "Let me point out one thing. VALUABLE HORSES PERISH

Farmers Near Perth Burned Out Loss.

Perth, June 12.—One of the most disastrous fires that has occurred in this section of the country completely wiped out the holdings of R. E. and Graham Wilson, on the South Line, early this morning. There prosperous young farmers reside on the old homestead at the head of the Scotch Line, and for years past have been gradually improving their stock, especially in horses. Last year they purchased a pure-bred Percheron stallion, for which they paid \$1,100, while the eight or ten other head of horses were also well bred. In addition to the horses and stallion, which were in the barn at the time the fire took place, the Messrs. Wilson, of Drummond, had a pure-bred Clyde stallion in the stable, having stopped there over night. How the fire originated is a mystery. The large bank barn, one of the finest in the district, and all the outbuildings were destroyed. In addition to the horses there were many articles of value stored in the buildings. The loss will be \$15,000 or \$18,000, partially covered by insurance.

Big New Summer Hotel.

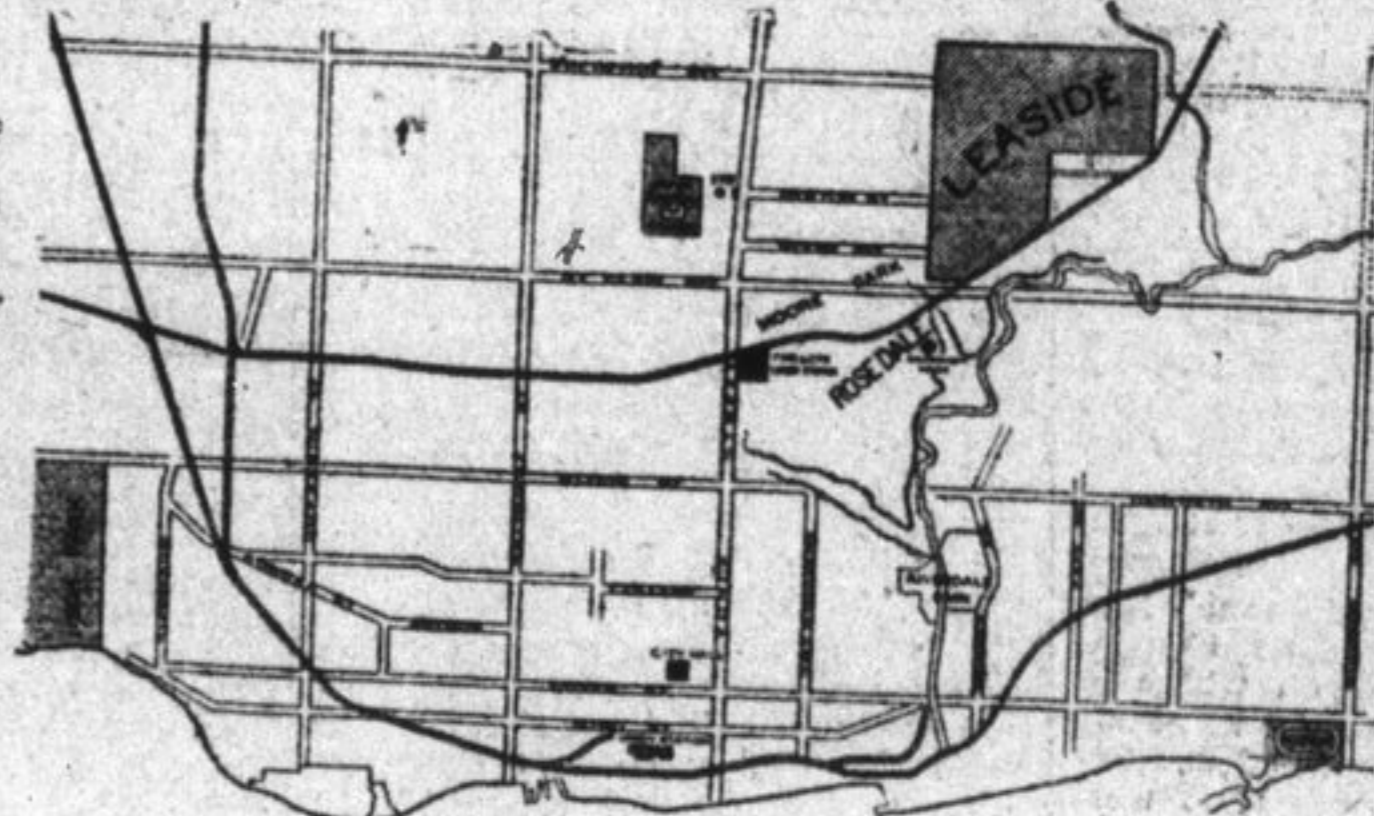
The Grand Trunk Pacific railway will open on June 26th a new summer hotel that will be among the largest and most modern in Canada. This is the Minaki Inn, a title derived from the Indian word meaning beautiful country. It is situated on the Winnipeg river, 114 miles east of the city of Winnipeg, amid beautiful scenery. Not only does the territory around afford the best of fishing to be had anywhere, but big game, waterfowl and grouse are plentiful. Moose, caribou, roe deer, and black bear roam through the whole region, and it is not unusual to see the branching antlers of a moose breaking the still waters of the lake near the hotel on a summer's evening. The hotel will be managed by the Canada Railway New company limited, and they have placed Mr. Crane, a hotelman with experience, in both the east and the west in charge.

The development of Leaside is progressing rapidly, most of the streets are graded, and some of them paved, work has commenced on the construction of sewers and watermains. One firm alone that has a factory on the property has begun the building of 150 houses which will be completed this year.
