RICH GOLD FIND ON T. & N. O.

Best Discovery Ever in Northern Ontario is Reported.

Haileybury, June 16 .- What is claimed to be the biggest gold find of Northern Ontario was uncovered in Maissonville township, near Sesikinike Station on the T. and N. O. Three veins between eighteen and thirty inches of quartz with heavy tellurides were found on the Labine claims. Assays give \$1,300 in gold and \$130 in silver to the ton, with a most spectacular surface showing. The find has caused more than ordinary interest among mining men. The claims lie fifteen miles northwest of Kirkland, and are owned by Haileybury men.
