M. Rankin, and the funeral will take
place on Wednesday at 2 p. m., to
Catarqui cemetery.

REAL WINDFALL FOR KING.

By Death of Lancashire Lady Majesty
Gets \$250,000.

Southport's intestate spinster,
Miss Amanda Cooper, has provided
the crown with one of its greatest
windfalls. Her fortune of \$51,000
will be paid to the treasury "for the
use of the King."

The phrase is no empty form of
words, says the "Sheffield Tele-
graph," for his majesty does have ac-
tual control over all estates which
revert to the crown in consequence of
their owners dying without relatives.
If these crown windfalls are estimat-
ed over a long course of years, it will
be found that the Southport amount
has several times been exceeded.

On two occasions the treasury has
raked in estates of no less than
£200,000—one from a Cheltenham
man in 1831, the other from a lum-
ber in 1884.

In recent years the most remark-
able instances of the crown's luck
was \$150,000 in 1905, from the tes-
tate of the romantic recluse of Folk-
stone, Captain George Lindsay An-
thony Wilson, who changed his
name, cut himself adrift from the
world, and allowed his possessions to
take care of themselves.

Weather Notes.

The high pressure is now centred in

cond term as president, died in an hos-
pital in this city Sunday. He was
seventy-eight years of age and had
been ill a long time.

QUEEN'S MEN GATHER.

Dr. Shortt Addresses University Men
on Journalism.

Montreal Journal of Commerce.

A very interesting and forceful
address on "Canadian Journalism"
was delivered last evening at the
National club, by Dr. Adam Shortt,
chairman of the Civil Service com-
mission, Ottawa, before a represen-
tative gathering of Queen's univer-
sity graduates and a number of dis-
tinguished guests, prominent among
whom were Hon. W. S. Fielding,
Professor John Macnaughton,
H. S. Ross, K.C., and others.

Dr. Shortt, in his characteristic
way, delved deep into his subject and
presented his audience with some
interesting historical material. His
whole treatment was broad and
philosophic, and many poignant phas-
es were passed on to his hearers on
the foibles and fallacies of the mod-
ern press.

He touched upon the work of
modern journalism under three
heads. First, the activities of the re-
portorial staff; secondly, the place
and power of the editor; thirdly,
the need for special articles of a
high type, couched in plain, idio-
matic English, of scientific indus-
trial and artistic interest. He
pleaded for a better appreciation of
the work of the reporter, both as
regards his salary and position;
asked for more individuality in the
work of the editor and pointed out
the necessity of securing articles of
merit from specialists in the vari-
ous fields of human endeavor.

Dr. John Macnaughton was in a
characteristic mood also, and de-
lighted his audience with scintil-
lating flashes of his powers of wit
and sarcasm. Mr. McMaster had
some fine things to say of the aver-
age Canadian citizen, whom he
found the equal of any in the world.

the Empress of Ireland, but was can-
celled to take an earlier boat by an
urgent cable from Europe.

**BY-LAW TO BONUS GANANOQUE-
ARMPRIOR RAILWAY.**

The Vote Took Place on Monday, and
the Result Was a Majority of 179
in Favor of the Measure.

Gananoque, June 16.—Voting on
the by-law to grant a bonus of
\$25,000 to the Gananoque-Armprior
railway, took place yesterday with
one poll in each ward. The by-law
was carried by a majority of 179
votes. The amount will be met by
town debentures payable in thirty
annual installments of interest and
principal, amounting to \$1,446,750.
