THE MARRIAGE CEREMONY
Has Outlived Its Usefulness, Says
Dr. Anna Shaw

Philadelphia, June 16.—The mar-
riage ceremony has outlived its use-
fulness and should be relegated to
oblivion. This, in a nutshell, is the
view of Dr. Anna Shaw, president of
the National Women Suffrage as-
sociation, on a subject which holds
such an important place at this time
of the year when wedding bells are
joyously pealing. The brides and
bridegrooms of this June time, as well
as other married folk, will no doubt
appreciate some more of her views
expressed in an interview on the mar-
riage contract.

"Why folks are always seeking an
old maid's view on matrimony is
something that I could never under-
stand," Dr. Shaw said. "But it seems
to be the case and what is more
some even go a step further and ask
me to marry them."

"The marriage service, for one
thing, is a poll parrot affair. The
method, as used in reciting the pledge
is ridiculous, to say the least. There
is no solemnity, dignity or character
to that kind of marriage."

"I have been accused of making
light of the nuptial ceremony be-
cause I refuse to follow this fash-
ion. To me, marriage is too sacred
an institution to prevent my allotted
sloganeering. The proof that I am right
lies in the success of the marriages
that I have performed—in the happi-
ness of the couples. I have officiated

at a great many ceremonies, especial-
ly when I had my own church in the
west, and I have never known of a
divorce among the parties in making
the ceremony fit the occasion. In
other words I have a different ser-
vice for each marriage.

"Long ceremonies are tiresome.
Therefore, I try to make mine as short
as possible."

"As for the word obey, I only had
one girl who wanted to make such a
crazy promise. In fact she insist-
ed upon it. There was only one
thing for me to do. I refused to
marry her. She had to take the
bridegroom to another minister."

"No woman obeys her husband. No
man with common sense asks his wife
to obey him. In fact, it is a great
disgrace to expect than to give
such a thing. No man would re-
spect another man for demanding it.
Therefore, I think that it is positiv-
ly wicked to use this word in the
marriage contract."

Amber Diamond Cut.
London, June 16.—An amber dia-
mond, weighing 178 1-2 carats,
which was found in Cape Colony
in London from Amsterdam, where
it has been cut. It now weighs 60
carats. The cutting took three
months and cost \$1250.

MANIFESTO

TO THE ELECTORS OF THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO:

tion.

The unanimous vote of many large non-partisan conventions and church courts has called upon the legislature to lessen these cruel evils by at least wiping out the barroom, the drinking club, and the whole treating system.

In accordance with this sound and patriotic policy we urge upon the friends of our cause the duty of doing their utmost to secure the nomination and election of men who will fairly represent the people upon this supreme issue.

We urge all right-thinking citizens to put their temperance principles before any more party preferences in the approaching contest, and vote only for candidates who can be relied upon to support the most advanced temperance measure brought before the Legis-
lature.

If, as we believe, this question is the most important before the electors of the province, a question that has long pressed for solution, if it is true that wise and enlightened leaders in all departments of commercial, industrial, and national life are becoming increasingly anxious to destroy the great destroyer, we feel justified in asking all who love their country and care for the highest interest of their fellowman to rise, if necessary, above party preference and affiliations, and insist that their representa-
tives shall be untrammelled in their relation to this issue.

Ministers and members of the Christian churches! The people of this Province have read and approved of the resolutions adopted from time to time by great ecclesiastical gatherings, and they look to you for leadership in this great campaign.

Electors of the Province! You have in your own hands the remedy for the conditions you deplore. This is a fight in which an alliance of the Christian churches of our land can defeat the sordid and solidly united forces that support the liquor traffic.

Will you act as independently for the fight as the liquor in-
terests do for their own selfish ends? If you do, the next
