though the waist is a slightly fitted foundation. There is an original bit of drapery at the front of the waist, arranged from either side and falling in a broad box pleat from the bust. The skirt is a two-piece affair, with beautiful sides and a caught-up back, arranged in side pleats below the hips.

The material will have to spread out full width to accommodate the outer section of the skirt (marked 7) and the outer front back and sleeve of the waist (the last three cut in one piece). These are marked by a line of large "x" perforations, which are laid on a lengthwise thread of the crepe. The pieces marked by triple "T" perforations, with the exception of the stay, arrange on a lengthwise fold; the stay goes on a crosswise fold. The girls 12 and 13 are cut on the bias. Perforations outline the round, square or V-shape for the neck.

Now make the lining, and if the shield is to be used place upon the front. The pleating of the front requires particular care. To do this bring "T" to small "x" perforation in left front, and the two single "T" perforations together on small "x" perforation in right front, upper edges even. Turn under edge of right front on slot perforations. Close under-arm and sleeve seams as a notch; close back seam. Close cuff seam as notched; sew to short sleeve, double "oo" perforations even, single perforation at seam; lap, corresponding perforations even. Gather lower edge of waist between double "T" perforations. Sew large collar to neck edge as notched. Arrange outside on lining, centers and under-arm seams even; stitch gathers along double "oo" perforations. The skirt is now finished and added to the waist, the belt and buttons completing the decorative scheme.
