LIVE STOCK MARKET.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Union Stock Yards, Toronto, June 22.—Receipts were large. 168 cars, 2633 cattle, 2658 hogs, 391 sheep and lambs, 139 calves.

Cattle.—Receipts were large, especially of grass fed. Quality was not as good as a week ago, that is of bulk of these on sale, only a few loads of what could be termed choice. Prices were about steady. Cows were lower. Choice butcher's steers, \$8.25 to \$8.60; good butcher's steers, \$8 to \$8.20; medium butcher's steers, \$7.80 to \$8.10; common butcher's steers, \$7.20 to \$7.65; choice butcher's heifers, \$8 to \$8.15; common butcher's heifers, \$7.75 to \$8; choice cows, \$6.75 to \$7; good cows, \$6.50 to \$6.75; canners, \$3 to \$4.20.

Feeders and stockers.—Trade about steady. Choice steers, \$7 to \$7.25; medium steers, \$6.75 to \$7; stockers, \$6 to \$6.50.

Milkers and springers.—Market slow, prices easier at \$50 to \$85 each; bulk sold at \$65 to \$70 each.

Calves.—Receipts moderate and prices very firm. Choice veals, \$9.50 to \$10.50; common to good \$7 to \$9.

Sheep and lambs.—Trade active at steady prices. Sheep, \$5.50 to \$6; culls and rams, \$4 to \$5; spring lambs, \$9 to \$11.50 per cwt.

Hogs.—Not many of these reported, were for sale all of the northwest hogs of which there were 2,500, being consigned to Swift Canadian company. Selected, fed and watered, \$7.85 and \$7.50 f.o.b. cars, and \$8.10 weighed off cars.
