

Ottawa, June 23-Elaborate regu lations have been issued by the naval department governing the issuing of licenses and the control of operation of all radio-telegraph equip ments in Canada, whether in the hands of amateurs of for commercial purposes, either on land or in Canadian registered vessels. The regulations are based on the uniform rules drawn up two years ago by the In-ternational Radio-Telegraph conven-tion. They apply not only to the "pro-fessional" wireless operator, but also to the hundreds of amateur operators throughout Canada, whose in-


