HIT TORPEDO WITH AXE

A SYDENHAM BOY SEVERELY INJURED IN EXPLOSION.

His Face and Neck Cut and Banned—Found Torpedo on Railway Track and Took it Home.
 On Tuesday afternoon William Johnston, son of Henry Johnston, Sydenham, narrowly escaped being killed. The lad, who is twelve years of age, was walking along the railroad track near Sydenham, and picked up one of the torpedoes which are placed there for giving signals. Thinking that he had obtained a fine thing to amuse himself with he placed it in his pocket and returned home. Going into the barn at the rear he placed this torpedo on a block and struck it with an axe. The missile exploded and the contents of it flared up and struck young Johnston under the chin, cutting his throat badly as well as giving him some nasty gashes upon the face. The powder also played an important part in forcing pieces of the torpedo into his flesh.
 Upon hearing the report the boys' parents rushed out to the barn to see what had happened but the smoke created by the explosion was so thick it was hard to ascertain the real result until some of the boys came from the building. Before they had gone far they found their son lying upon the floor in great agony. A doctor was immediately summoned and dressed the wounds which required several stitches to close.
 The boy will recover but the chances are that he will carry a bad scar for the remainder of his days.

 There is no foundation for the rumor at Petawawa and alleged Ottawa report, that the 14th Regiment refused to move from camp to participate in the manoeuvres. On Monday the Kingston Rifles proceeded to bivouac eleven miles distant in much less time than some columns bivouacked at Cory Lake Monday night.
 The 14th formed an advance guard on the 8th infantry brigade, under Lieut.-Col. Kent, marching southerly, took part in the fighting and went into bivouac with the men almost fatigued for want of the different regiments strenuously disputed around the water wagons, limited in number.

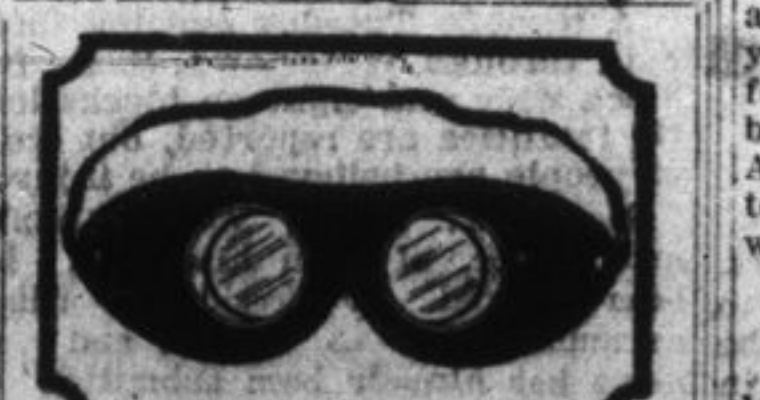

A QUEEN'S GRADUATE

INVENTS FERTILIZER WHICH HE REFUSES \$250,000.

It is Made From By-products That Were Formerly Wasted—Will Revolutionize Agriculture.
 After four years of work upon a new nitrogenous fertilizer that, it is said will revolutionize the industry of agriculture, Earl S. Bishop, an investigator at the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research, Pittsburgh, Pa., on Saturday refused an offer of \$250,000 for his formula and process. The offer, was made by a Pittsburgh capitalist, but was refused outright.
 Mr. Bishop is a young man, and has been at the Mellon Institute conducting research since January 1st, 1913. He secured his degree as a doctor of science in 1912 at Queen's University, Kingston, Ont. His home is at Lincoln, Neb.
 The value of the new fertilizer, he says, lies in the fact that it can be produced at less cost than any other nitrogenous fertilizer now on the market. It is made from by-products that were formerly wasted, and can be obtained much cheaper than any other fertilizer. Also it is formed at a low temperature, while the others are formed at a high temperature at much greater cost.
