MAY BE ENGINEERS STRIKE.

Says Unconfirmed Rumor Published in Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, June 24 — An evening paper says: "Local members of the Locomotive Engineers and Firemen's Unions are discussing the possibility of a general strike of their unions following the failure of the railway companies and unions to agree upon a schedule at the recent conference in Chicago."

"According to present information received by the men, a general strike on all lines west of Chicago, including the United States and Canada, will be ordered on July 15 next. This covers ninety-five different railways, and hundreds of thousands of men. In Western Canada all systems are involved, and 3,000 men, roughly estimated will go out."

"While the general statement is that Canadian lines will be involved in the strike, there has been no confirmation of this received from the Winnipeg headquarters of the organization. In the past all disputes between the company and the men have been submitted to a court of arbitration provided under the Lemieux Act. Whether the Canadian unions will appeal to this court before a general strike is called is not known."

CANADA TO HELP STATES

Dr. J. A. Macdonald Says Two Countries Must Stand Together

Iowa City, Iowa, June 24 — That Canada will be found ready to aid the United States in case of war with Japan, even to participating in the conflict, was the message of Dr. J. A. Macdonald, of Toronto, in giving the commencement address before 400 graduates of the University of Iowa last week.

"If armsaddon comes, Canada will be found fighting side by side with the United States," said the speaker. "A menace from the Pacific against the western shore of this country is a menace against Canada also, and the English speaking people of North America must stand together against an invasion from the Orient."

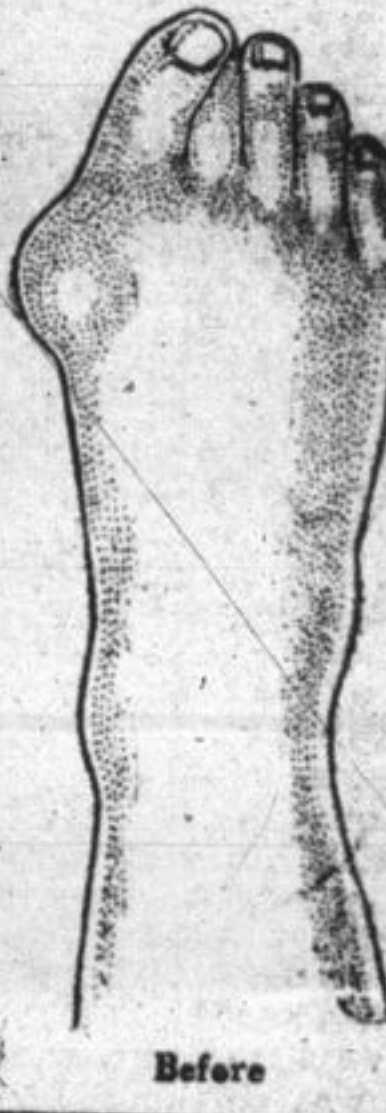

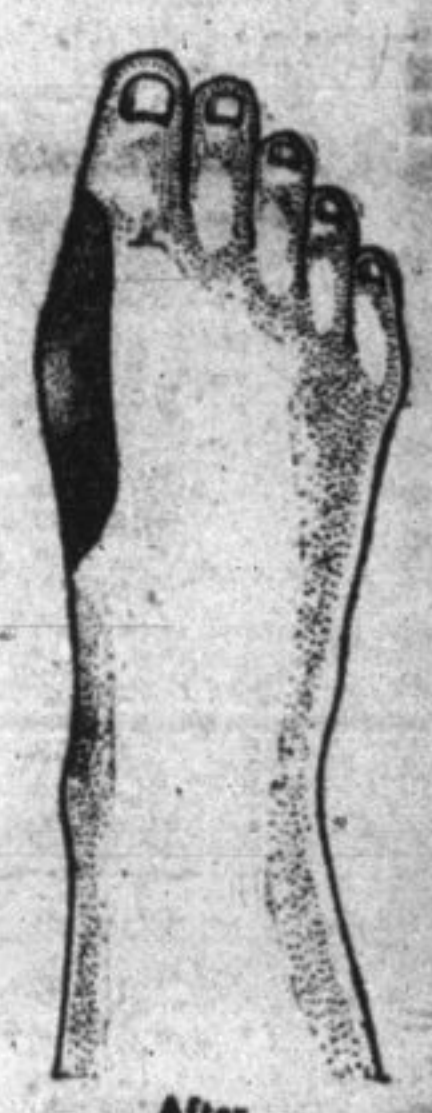
