IN THE SUMMER INSTEAD OF IN THE WINTER.

The Change May be Made—Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Synod on Thursday.

That in the opinion of the executive committee, it would conduce to the convenience of the church people of the diocese, were the meetings of synod held in the summer instead of in the winter, and that their lordships the bishop and co-adjutor bishop be and are respectfully requested to take into consideration the change of time mentioned and to cause to be enacted any legislation as to the time of meetings of the standing committees or otherwise, which may be rendered necessary by the change of date of the meeting of synod.

The above resolution was passed on Thursday morning, at a meeting of the executive committee of the synod of the diocese of Ontario, on motion of Judge H. S. McDonald, the chancellor, seconded by F. P. Miller.

Rev. F. L. Barber wrote asking the executive to confirm a recent sale of land made by the parish of St. Mary Magdalene church at Picton. On motion of the chancellor, seconded by R. J. Carson, the sale was confirmed. The sale amounted to \$150.

Archdeacon Dobbs was appointed as a representative to attend the funeral of the late S. H. Blake, K. C., of Toronto.

Permission was granted the parish of Trenton for the sale of a lot. A resolution was passed on motion of Rev. H. H. Bedford-Jones, seconded by Rural Dean F. D. Woodcock expressing the great loss the synod had suffered as a result of the death of Allan Turner, of Brockville, who rendered valuable service on synod committees, and who was at all times diligent in the discharge of his duties. A copy of the resolution will be sent to the wife and family of the deceased.

Bishop Mills announced that he had appointed J. W. Dawson, of Brockville, to fill the place on the committee made vacant by the death of Mr. Turner.

The committee before adjourning extended best wishes to Rev. W. F. Fitzgibbon and wife for their leaving next week on a trip to the Isle of Man, England and Ireland, for a safe and happy voyage.

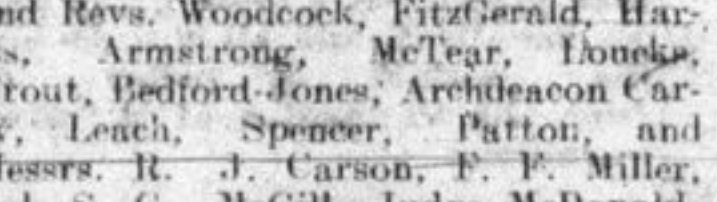
