An Echo of 1838.

Just seventy-six years ago, June 21, 1838 the papers were printing first detailed news of the burning of the steamer Sir Robert Peel, near Thousand Island Bark, during the troublous days of the Patriot war. Although the boat really burned on the night of May 30th, 1838, news of the world moved slower in those days than now, and it was not until three weeks later that the account was published in Kingston. The boat was destroyed at Wellesley Island by a pirate band during the stirring days of the Patriot war. She was going down the St. Lawrence when she was attacked and burned The passengers were picked up and taken to Kingston.


