Examination to-day in headquarters before being taken before the district attorney the girl told her story without a quiver.

BISHOP DUNN TO RESIGN. Will Retire to Private Life After November First. Quebec, June 25.—The impending resignation from the episcopal seat of the Anglican diocese of Quebec of the Right Rev. Andrew Hunter Dunn was announced by the lord bishop himself at the close of his visitation charge to clergy, he informed them he had decided to set aside the cares of his sacred office and retire to private life.

The exact date which his lordship has selected for his resignation to take effect is the festival of All Saints, Nov. 1st, 1914. The Right Rev. Andrew Hunter Dunn, M.A., (Cambridge), was born at Saffron Walden, Essex, England, on Oct. 16th, 1833, the son of Hannah Dunn and Mary Ann, daughter of William Hunter, alderman, sheriff, and lord mayor of London. After graduating from Cambridge with the degree of master of arts and studying for the church he was ordained.

His lordship came to Canada in 1892 and was consecrated bishop of Quebec on Sept. 1st that year. He married Miss Alice, eldest daughter of William Hunter, of Valley Lodge, Crofton, and five sons and two daughters were born of the union.



KING PETER OF SERBIA Who succeeded the throne in favor of his second son, Prince Alexander. HACKETT MUST WAIT OVER A YEAR FOR HIS FUTURE. Then He Will Get Estate Which Has Just Been Valued at \$1,389,049.95. The value of the estate left by Mrs. Annie Hackett, Trowbridge to her uncle, the well-known actor, is \$1,389,049.95. Practically all of this property goes to Hackett, but he will not be in possession of the principal until after a trust company has had eighteen months Mr. Hackett will be more than a bare millionaire.

The judicial accounting of the estate was made in New York this week. The report shows that the income from the estate since March 4th the day after Mrs. Trowbridge died, was \$69,352.60; cash on hand, \$204,663.83, and that the household furniture, including pictures is worth \$75,146.50. The pictures are valued at \$53,900. The most valuable of the paintings are "Arabian Cavalry," by Adolph Schreyer, \$7,500; "Girl in Garden," by Ridgway Knight, \$2,800; "Goats in Barn," by Eugene Verboekhoven, \$2,500; "Flowers," by J. Robie, \$12,500; "Mother and Child," by W. Bouckroon, \$1,800; "Pledge of Love," by P. Soulaireux, \$1,200, and "The Vintage Festival," by Joseph Coomans, \$1,800. All of the paintings are in the house at 72 Park avenue, which is now owned by Mr. Hackett.

The value of the personal property and securities is fixed at \$1,222,681.21. The disbursements have been \$169,884.41. The will of Mrs. Trowbridge that was admitted to probate was dated January 9, 1908. After making certain bequests the residue of the estate was left to her husband, Francis E. Trowbridge, when she married after he had lost everything by speculating in Wall street. Mr. Trowbridge died in 1910. Mrs. Trowbridge had suffered from a severe illness and when she recovered it was found that her mind had become impaired. She was Mr. Hackett's niece and he was her next of kin and unless the property could be left elsewhere by will it would fall heir to it. Mrs. Trowbridge knew this and desired very much to keep it from him.

Mrs. Trowbridge tried to make another will that would stand in law, but there was enough proof to show that she was mentally defective and so her efforts failed and the estate goes to Mr. Hackett. Other relatives threatened contest but these were all dropped because it was clear that no contest would stand in the courts.

Huskies for Shackleton. Selkirk, Man., June 25.—Three carloads of husky dogs for Sir Ernest Shackleton here for Montreal, where they will be transferred to the steamer Montcalm and shipped to Liverpool. There were one hundred dogs in all, each in a separate crate. The huskies were purchased at different points on Lake Winnipeg by Mr. Henry, the Hudson Bay company's fur trade commissioner; John Johnson, John Isfeld and John Costenian, of Gimli, and Mr. McNab, the Hudson Bay company's representative, will accompany the shipment to Liverpool. Do the Right Thing. Let us do the right thing and knock these bars out once and for all. The demand of the people is for the abolition of the bar, shop licenses, club licenses and the whole traffic. Mr. Rowell proposes to do away with all bar and club licenses and leave the shop licenses under local option. BRICK CO. REPORTS LOSS Due to General Slump in Building Trade. Montreal, June 24.—The Canada Brick company, which operates a plant at St. Lambert, Que., and another at Mile End, shows a loss from operations to December 31, 1913, of \$8,524. The report states that the loss was due to the general slump in the building trade, accompanying the financial depression throughout the Dominion. The company is capitalized at \$600,000 in common and \$200,000 in preferred, of which only half of each has been issued.

Small Profits. Montreal, June 24.—The report of Ames-Holden McCready, Limited, for the fiscal year ended April 30, 1914, shows net profits of \$307,598, as compared with \$351,390 for the previous year. As shown by the company's profit and loss account a surplus of \$6,296 remained after payment of charges and full preferred dividends.

The Story Denied. Toronto, June 24.—It is denied that stock of the Acme Gold Mines, which holds the well known Dixon claims adjoining the Hollinger and which is controlled by the Flamingo-McCarthy-Dunlop syndicate, is to be put out soon, and that it will be offered to Hollinger stockholders at \$4 a share.

Erie Railroad Earnings. New York, June 24.—Erie railroad's gross earnings in May decreased \$520,000, or over 9 per cent., as compared with May, 1913, and indications point to a similar loss for June.

Have Assigned. Toronto, June 24.—The Bailey Cobalt mines have assigned to the Trust and Guarantee company, and a meeting of creditors has been called for June 30.

Abitibi Paper Issue. Toronto, June 24.—It is reported that the Abitibi Pulp and Paper company will shortly make an issue of \$1,000,000 par value of preferred stock to finance the operations now being carried on at the company's plant at Iroquois Falls, Ont.

Commercial Notes. A huge wave of speculation in oil shares in the British markets has been predicted. South-Western Steel Development of Galveston, a \$30,000,000 company, has been financed by European capital. J. B. Holden, Toronto, has been elected a member of the board of directors of the Hollinger Gold Mines in succession to the late Duncan McMartin. Jay P. Graves has resigned as general manager of Granby Consolidated Mines, and his assistant, Mr. F. M. Sylvester, takes his place. Mr. Graves is still vice-president of the company.

Hollinger gross profits for the four weeks ending May 20th, were \$123,087, which with the exception of April, is the best showing of the year, and being only \$436 behind the April period, which was an exceptionally good one. Improvements costing approximately \$10,000,000 and affording employment for 4,000 men are now under way and planned for the Illinois Central. Directors of the Standard Reliance Mortgage corporations, Toronto, have placed the stock on a 7 per cent. dividend basis, the rate being advanced from 6 per cent. Trethewey directors have declared a five per cent. dividend, payable July 15th. This is the first dividend this year, and calls for a disbursement of \$50,000. It is understood the directors will have about \$100,000 in the treasury after the dividend is paid. The property is producing from \$8,000 to \$10,000 monthly above expenses. Per inch, \$2,369.67. That's the latest estimate of the value of property on Broadway, New York. The figures came out with announcement of the sale of a corner at Thirty-fifth street, which for many years has been occupied as a theater. The total price paid was \$6,000,000, a rate of \$28,436 a front foot.
