**BOY MADE HIS ESCAPE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY ELECTION WAS QUIET**

**AFTER BEING TAKEN TO INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL**

Arrived Back in Kingston Shortly After Constable Who Handed Him Over to School — Will Not Likely Be Taken Back.

Shortly after he had been handed over to the authorities at the industrial school at Toronto, by Constable Smith, a sixteen-year-old boy named Smith, who had been slaying with a farmer in the county, succeeded in making his escape and arrived back in Kingston just a short time after Constable Smith reached here. It is believed that the youth came down from Toronto on the same train as the constable.

Constable Smith delivered the lad to the institution a few days ago, and after arriving home, was very much surprised when he was informed that the youngster had reported at the farm where he had been living.

Up till the present time no steps have been taken to again place the boy in the school, and it was stated on Monday morning that it was not likely that he would be taken there again. The boy is working steadily now, and as long as he behaves himself, he will be left alone.

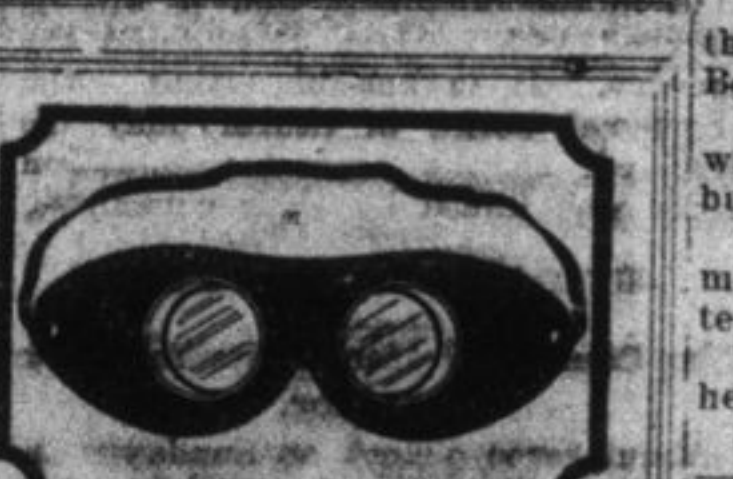

**BUT THERE WAS LOTS OF CONSERVATIVE MONEY.**

The Liberals Depended Entirely Upon the "Silent" Vote as They Had No Money to Buy Votes.

The provincial election in Kingston, Monday, although the total vote recorded at the polls will likely be a record, was quietly conducted. Early in the morning, it looked as though it would be a rainy day, but during the morning polling hours, the campaign held off, making the work of the campaigners more agreeable than otherwise would have been.

While the liberal workers realized that they were up against a stiff proposition in a place like Kingston, and up against a big liquor campaign fund, they still were hopeful that the "silent" vote would come Harrison's way on the moral question at issue.

A good many conservative votes went to the liberal candidate. The liberals had no money to distribute for the purchase of voters' franchise, but told those looking for the "take" to take all they could get and then vote as their conscience told them. It is generally recognized that there are from 600 to 800 votes in Kingston, that can be bought—enough to swing an election the way of the coin.

Both parties were well organized in the way of conveyances. The supporters of Harrison had thirty automobiles and four cabs. It was to be seen that the conservative and liquor interests had a strong organization at the polling subdivision, superior to that of the liberals.

That every possible vote for Ross was going to be registered was evident when a patient in the Hotel Dieu, who recently had both his feet amputated, was carried to the polls to mark his ballot.

A liberal military man stated that the conservatives would see to it that every Ross voter would get in from Petawawa for this election. A certain number of the artillerymen are required to look after the horses in camp, and it is pretty certain those left behind will not be conservative.

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**THE ELECTION RETURNS.**
