A CONTRACT RECEIVED

BY THE CANADIAN LOCOMOTIVE WORKS, KINGSTON.

General Manager Wheatley Expects That the Works Will Begin to be Very Busy Next Fall.

The Whig was informed, on Tuesday morning, by A. W. Wheatley, general manager of the Canadian Locomotive works, that this works has received contracts for the gray-iron castings for ten locomotives for the Canada Foundry company, Toronto. This will be a wonderful lift for the works and will greatly help in maintaining good conditions about the various shops until further orders come in, which Mr. Wheatley is very hopeful of receiving.

There are at present about four hundred and fifty employees at work and it was Mr. Wheatley's belief that this coming fall will see many more engaged. The crops in the west are showing up well, which cannot mean anything else but a loosening up of the present hard times and creating prosperity. As everybody knows, with a bumper crop it will require many trains to carry it east. Therefore, the demand will be for more locomotives, which have dwindled down during the hard times, which, happily, are now about over.

The employees now at work in these shops of the locomotive works were glad to hear of this contract, for they know this is only the beginning of better times.

Case Again Enlarged.

The case of Walter Switzer vs. the Dominion Construction company, Limited, again required the attention of Judge H. A. Lavell at the adjourned sitting of the county court at the court house on Tuesday morning. The plaintiff is asking damages for injury done to his right of way by the construction company. The case was heard on June 19th and was adjourned for ten days to allow the company to complete the road. Since the road has been completed the plaintiff claims that the highway is a great deal steeper. After hearing the evidence on Tuesday morning the judge enlarged the case for two weeks' time.

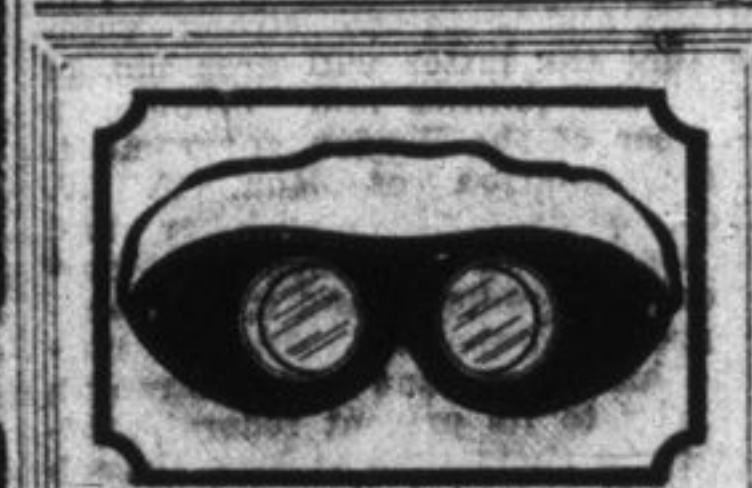
The Liberals Won.
