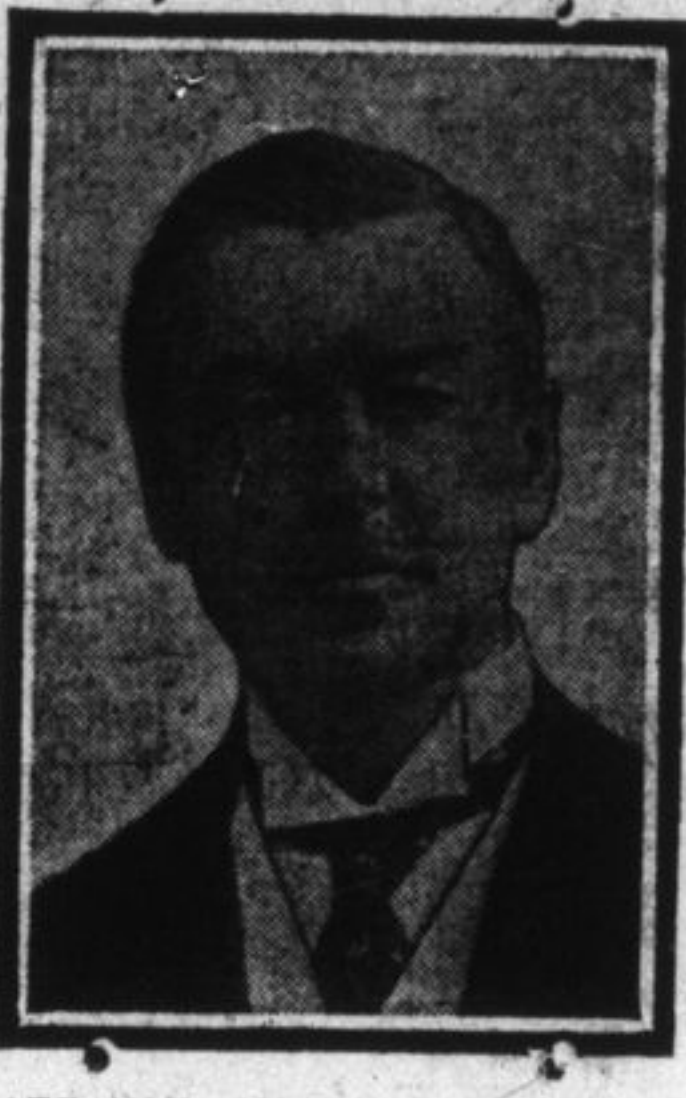
Attack of Heart Failure Carried Him Away

DEATH NOT EXPECTED

BY GENERAL PUBLIC—ONLY ONE PAPER KNEW IT.

Chamberlain Blamed for Starting the South African War.—He Was Most Cordially Loved and Hated Political Figure of His Time.

London, July 3.—The Right Honorable Joseph Chamberlain for many years the most outstanding figure in British politics, died last night at ten o'clock, aged seventy-eight. The cause of death was heart failure, but he had been ill for some time.

UNITED STATES IRISH Kill Plan to Celebrate 100 Years of Peace.

Washington, July 3.—The fact that a few Irish-American societies based themselves and petitioned congress in an anti-British uprising against the celebration of the peace centennial and the hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Ghent Treaty, has put a serious set-back to the plans of the peace societies which are endeavoring to have the United States make a prominent part as a government in the celebration.

The test vote on the resolution to authorize the president to appoint a commission to represent the United States government at the centennial was overwhelmingly an anti-British demonstration in the house, and the complete ballot was four to one against the plans of the peace societies.

Philadelphia, July 3.—Thomas Lowrey, former butler in a fashionable family, charged with fraudulently obtaining \$65,000 from fellow servants, which he pretended to invest in get-rich-quick securities, "blame shop," for his detention in Moyamensing prison. A brokerage firm "stung" Lowrey according to his testimony at the trial, allowing him to make impressive winnings from time to time, which gained him the reputation among servants as a financier.

CANADA WILL DEPORT DEPENDENT IMMIGRANTS

Government Besieged By Foreigners Out Of Work

MANY ARE PENNILESS

WANT EMPLOYMENT OR TRANSPORTATION HOME.

Bread Line at Ottawa City Hall—They Believed Immigrant Literature, and Came to This Land of Opportunity.

Ottawa, July 3.—Conditions of unemployment in Canada were brought sharply home to the government yesterday afternoon, when some four or five hundred of unskilled laborers, most of them dependents, assembled outside the immigration offices and asked for work, or for assistance of some kind. They said that they had come to Canada believing the government's immigration literature of recent years that this was the land of opportunity for all. They have been out of work in the capital now for months, and are penniless. If work was not to be had they wanted transportation back to their homes in Central and Eastern Europe, where the bulk of the immigration has come since the present government assumed office.

The reply of the departmental officials was that, under existing conditions, the government could do little towards finding employment, except in the case of those who were fitted for and wanted to work as farm laborers. Efforts are being made by the department to send as many of the men out on the farms as can be accommodated there under the somewhat restricted present demand. Meanwhile there has been a bread line at the city hall for the past few mornings and free food has been supplied by the civic charity office to a limited extent.

In view of similar conditions existing in Montreal, Winnipeg and other cities, the department is taking steps to arrange for the deportation of all immigrants who have become chargeable on public charities. Under the immigration act any immigrant who becomes a public charge within three years of his arrival in Canada may be sent back to his home at the expense of the transportation company which brought him on. The departmental authorities request the deportation of any of those now in the civic bread lines, the department will look after their deportation.

To Finish in a Month.

At the outside, the new pavement on Prince street will be finished in one month, was the information given to the Whig to-day. The south track has been all finished and the ties are being tamped on the north track as far down as King street.

The cement works at near Bagot street, and they are laying the Bagot and King street switches. The asphalt plant is ready to start anytime, being set up near the G. T. R. freight sheds on Wellington street.

The blocks that are to be put in around the track have not yet arrived, and the asphalt cannot be laid ahead of the blocks. All the obstructions, such as sand and stone piles, have been removed between Montreal and Sydenham streets.

Walter Cox, rector of Gannaque, was present for a short time on the grounds.

PRESIDENT IS PROUD OF HIS DELEGATES

To The Mexican Peace Conference At Niagara Falls—He Tells Them So

Washington, D.C., July 3.—"I am intensely proud of the way you represented your country," was President Wilson's salutation in the White House corridor to-day to Justice Lansing and Frederick Lehman, United States commissioners to the mediation conference, who arrived from Niagara Falls, Ont., to-day.

They said the conferences would be resumed as soon as the warring Mexican factions could be brought together on a plan of provisional government.

Clamor for Vote.

Stockholm, July 3.—The Swedish parliament received a monster petition signed by 350,000 women in favor of women's enfranchisement. A bill having that object is now in the diet and has the support of the entire liberal party, but it is expected that the first chamber will reject it.
