Chamberlain Blamed for Starting the South African War .-- He Was Most Cordially Loved and Hated Political Figure of His Time.

London, July 3 .- The Right Honorable Joseph Chamberlain for many years the most outstanding figure British polities, died last night ten o'clock, aged seventy-eight. The cause of death was heart failure, but deceased succumbed from a protracted illness which for years barred him from active public life All members of the immediate fami ly were present when the end came but so unexpected was his passing to the general public that only one

For two generations he practically held the politics of his native city of Birmingham in the hollow of his hand He was was always elected when he ran for the commons and six fellow-members from that city were invariably his nominees.

Mr. Chamberlain has been both liberal and conservative, but greatest policy was imperialism and tariff reform. He was blamed for starting the South African war. He was the most cordially loved and hated political figure of his time Chamberlain was wealthy, and was thrice married, his third and surviving wife being a United States-
