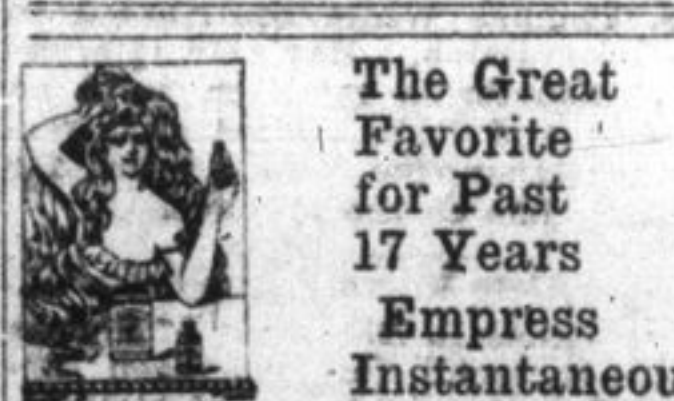

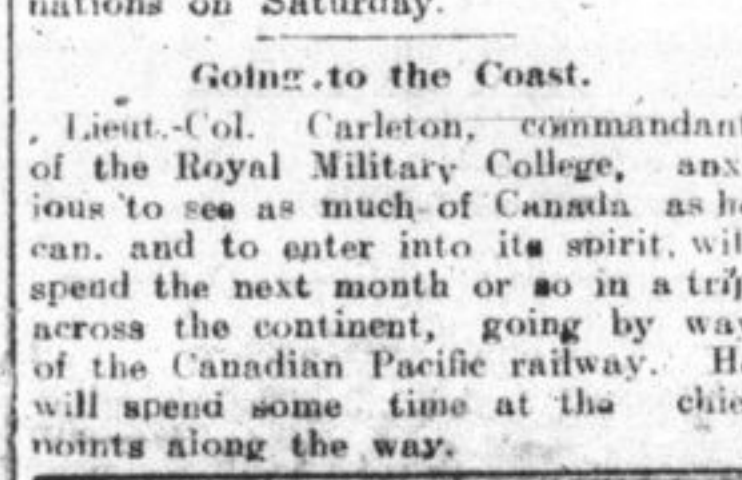

BARBERS HAD BAD TIME. Stranded in Middle of River Most of Wednesday. To be tossed at the mercy of waves in an open motor boat was the experience of nine local barbers on Wednesday evening. The barbers left the city on Wednesday morning for the purpose of taking a sail down the St. Lawrence. When they arrived in the vicinity of Howe Island the rain started to come down, and as a result the engine in the boat stopped. As much as the tonorial artists worked with the engine it refused to start, and as a result they were left stranded in the motorboat in the middle of the river. After the men had drifted for some time, it was decided to put the canoe which was being towed behind the launch in commission, and by that means some of the men were able to get on the mainland. A big fire was lighted for the purpose of attracting the attention of some of the people who might pass up the river in the vicinity where the motorboat was stranded, but no person paid any attention. After the barbers remained on the shore for a considerable time, it was decided that two would go in the canoe to Kingston and get a large motorboat to come down and rescue their companions. When the motorboat arrived, shortly after one o'clock, the men, who were soaking to the skin, got into the launch and arrived home about four o'clock.
