

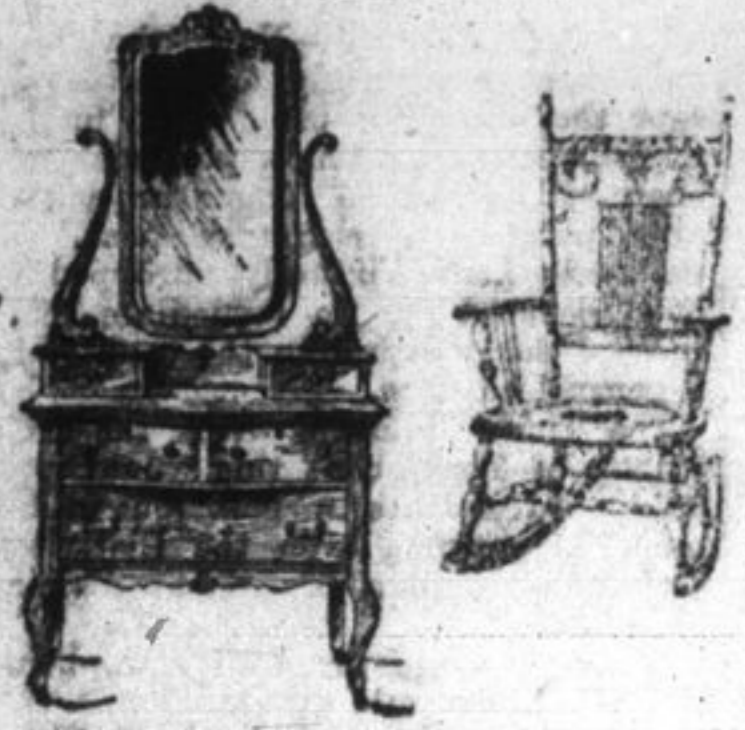

THE BOARD OF WORKS

RECOMMENDS SHEET ASPHALT FOR RESIDENTIAL STREETS

And Will Ask the City Council to Accept the Tender of Foley and Gleason, Ottawa, Whose Figure is \$125,000.

The Board of Works will recommend to the City Council on Monday night that the tender of Foley and Gleason, Ottawa, to lay on a four-inch concrete base, 50,000 sq. yards sheet asphalt on residential roadways, recently named, be accepted.

There was some discussion in the board meeting on Friday afternoon as to the advisability of proceeding with so much road work this year.

Ald. Litton and Fair disagreed with Ald. O'Connor. They held that it would be cheaper in the long run to put down good paving.

Ald. Hughes held that if pavement was to be laid, the best should be selected. He favored sheet asphalt, for he didn't look upon tarvia or romanic as anything more than water bound macadam.

The chairman said that the only way to make the utilities commission act was to award a paving contract then it would have to get busy.

Half a dozen tenders were received for the paving, the materials upon which prices were created being sheet asphalt, asphaltic concrete, bitulithic, tarvia and romanic.

A communication was received from W. B. Dalton & Sons, asking that the roadways around the corner of Ontario and Princess streets be closed, so as to keep down the dust.

The chairman said that W. McNamee objected to three trees in front of his property on Upper William street being cut down unless he was paid for them.

It was decided to accept the price offered by Foley and Gleason for extra work in the track allowance on King and Princess streets.

In attendance at the meeting were Alds. Litton (chairman), Fair, Hughes, O'Connor and Sutherland.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Two Very Poor Examples Are Subdivisions 5 and 7.

Kingston, July 4.—(To the Editor): Your local contemporary, in its endeavor to refute a paragraph in your issue of Thursday, stating that it was the "floaters" vote that elected Dr. Ross, cites two very poor examples when it refers to the vote cast in St. Lawrence, No. 5, and Cataract, No. 7.

Most natural indeed was it for these two "business" subdivisions to go strongly for the bar candidate. At No. 5 there is a grist of "floaters."

Napanee's Fiftieth Anniversary

Tuesday was the fiftieth anniversary of the town of Napanee, which was incorporated as a village on June 30th, 1864. The following paragraph is from W. S. Herzington's history of Lennox and Addington. "There was something incongruous in village of Napanee having been proclaimed a county town, and the only remedy was to have the corporation raised one step higher in the municipal scale. It had passed from a hamlet to a police village, from a police village to an incorporated village, and on June 30th, 1864 an act of the legislature council and assembly of Canada received the royal assent, whereby the village became an incorporated town from December 1st of the same year.

At the ensuing election B. C. Cary was elected its first mayor. John Stevenson, reeve, William McGilvray deputy reeve and William Miller, John T. Grange, S. McL. Deller, M. T. Rogers, John Gibbard, John Herring and H. T. Forward, councillors.

Located in Kingston. Patrick O'Grady, aged seventy-five, who has been missing from Perth since June 17th, has been located in Kingston. It appears the old man wandered away from his home and tramped nearly all the way to Kingston and was cared for at the House of Providence. The authorities at the House of Providence reported to the Whig on Friday and Perth has been notified. The Whig had an advertisement asking for information concerning O'Grady's whereabouts.

A Sudden Death.

A sudden death occurred at Hayburn, on July 2nd, in the person of Maggie A. Hoffman, beloved wife of Major A. B. Loyd. Death was due to heart failure caused by over exertion. Mrs. Loyd was a young woman of about forty years. She was well known all through Lennox county.

14TH OVER 300 STRONG

ON ITS PLEASURE TRIP TO WATERTOWN, N. Y.

It Will Return at Noon, Sunday.—The Plan of Entertainment in Watertown.

Sharp at 7.30 o'clock, on Friday evening, over three hundred members of the 14th Regiment lined up in the Armouries for their march to the steamer America. The line of march was over Montreal street and down Brock street. The streets were lined with people and an immense crowd were at the wharf to see the "soldier boys" depart for Watertown, N.Y., to celebrate the 4th of July with their American cousins.

Thirty-five is the full number of the bugle band and thirty-two buglers went on the trip. This is a particularly good showing. Two little fellows in the bugle band were Buglers Preston and Frappe, but in volume and quality they did as good as the best.

At eight o'clock the regiment marched through the wharf gate and went on board. The brass band, on the bow of the steamer, gave two good selections. This band made a very good turn-out, all the members having made special efforts to get away.

The lake was calm and the moonlight made the trip all that could be desired.

The men arrived in Watertown shortly before eleven o'clock, and marched at once to the Armouries through streets, even at that time, lined with people to welcome them. The officers were the guests of the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks at the New Woodruff hotel, the men sleeping in the Armouries.

The plans were to march in the parade composed of American troops through streets, Harbor and other places, to the fair grounds. At the grounds the civic committee has arranged a programme of sports, one item being a race for the soldiers in the 14th, in their "heavy marching order" that is with knapsack and greatcoat. The regiment will leave Watertown Sunday morning, and is expected to arrive in the city at noon.
