### ON BARRIEFIELD HEIGHTS ALL DAY MONDAY.

Col. T. D. R. Hemming Will Command—The Camp Rules are Very Strict—The Boys Must Obey.

Commencing at an early hour on Monday morning, the cadets of the different corps of the 3rd divisional area will commence to gather at Barriefield heights. It is expected that by Monday evening there will be about 2,500 boys under canvas.

As this is the largest cadet camp which has been held in this division, the cadets are looking forward with great interest to the outing.

Those who have had charge of making arrangements have left no stone unturned that would hinder the boys from having the "time of their lives."

It is the intention of those in charge that every boy will obey the rules which have been laid down. No boy will be allowed to smoke while on the camp grounds. Cigarettes are forbidden to be sold on the grounds. The rules are very strict in connection with swimming. No boy will be allowed to go in the water unless that there is some officer in charge of the swimming grounds.

Col. T. D. R. Hemming, who is commanding, is very much interested in the boys, and for that reason no mother should be afraid to let her son take part in the outing.

Every boy will be given lots to eat. Reid and Hambrook, who have charge of the catering, have made special arrangements for the feeding of the lads. In the past, the grub was put up by the Army service corps.

It is expected that a number of the teachers, who accompany the cadet corps, will take advantage of course of instruction which is to be held at the camp. After six days of work at Barriefield, the teachers will go to Ottawa for four weeks.

### LINKING UP VANCOUVER

Vith Main Line of Grand Trunk Pacific.

Splendid progress is being made on the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern railway, which will link up the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Prince George with the City of Vancouver.

The Pacific Great Eastern is at the present time operating a suburban rail service between North Vancouver Ferry Landing at Lonsdale avenue and Dunderburg, West Vancouver, a distance of five miles. Early next month they expect to extend this service to Horseshoe Bay, about three miles from the ferry landing. They are also at the present time carrying traffic between Squamish, at the head of Howe Sound, and Cheakamus, a distance of about eleven miles.

The track of this latter section is now being extended northward, grading between the end of track and Fraser river, one hundred miles north of Vancouver, is practically finished, but on account of unfinished bridging it is not expected that track will be into Lillooet before late in the fall of this year.

The entire balance of the line between Lillooet and Prince George is under contract, and it is expected that a force of 6,000 men will be employed to ensure the earliest possible completion of the work. It is impossible to say yet when the line will be finished, although the engineers hope to have the line to "Prince George graded by the end of this year."
