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

Just across the line in New Yorl state there is looming up a Ba ish-the-Bar agitation that threatens to become as big an issue in that community as it has been in Ontario. And the man who is responsfble for waking up the temperance people of the empire state to the possibly of striking a death blow at the liquor traffic is William . H. Anderson, the Napoleonic leader of the anti-saloon league of the United States, who has recently begun activities there.

His first move was to introduce local option measure in the legislative assembly. William Barnes, the republican boss and the judiciary promptly squeiched it. Mr. Anderson addressed a letter to Mr. Barnes as "Boss of the liquor end of the republican party." Barnes did not like it, and has announced that he is suing Mr. Anderson for libel. The antisaloon man has welcomed the suit as an opportunity to make public the alliance between the liquor men and certain politicians. Political Storm Centre.

The anti-saloon league will be the political storm centre of the United States during the coming congressional campaign, The national prohibition amendment will be submitted to the next congress as a result of the league's agitation.

Anderson was in a great measure responsible for the submission of this amendment to congress. When the sub-committee of the senate judiciary committee held a hearing on the matter, Anderson was asked to speak. He read a letter instead, letter from the Kentucky distillers' distributing company of Kansas

The last portage was half a mile long at the Grand Rapids of the Athabasca and it was done by Indian employes of the Hudson Bay company.
