

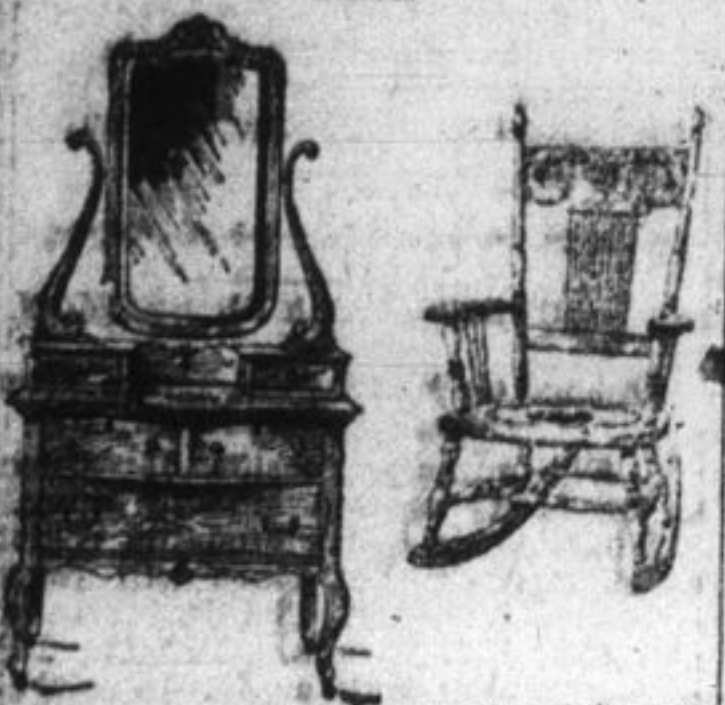

"DEMAGOGIC" CLERGY

REV. DR. CARLIAN REPLIES TO PREMIER WHITNEY.

He Says the "Demagogic" Clergy Have Sounded a Note That Must Test and Prove Our Manhood.

It cannot but be the occasion of much sorrow to us all to observe any indication of this province's prime minister to have full recovered from the severe strain of the illness that during the winter beclouded the country with such anxiety and grief. Can this be now the old-time redoubtable Sir James who, with many of his followers, Rowell with his cohorts of "demagogic clergy" have frightened well nigh out of their wits certainly out of the minds of clear vision and safe utterance? The language used by these "demagogic clergy" in the pulpits is characterized by the premier as violent and abusive, the seals crackling, it may be, under "shuddering listeners," while these nervous men of the clergy made a "cold-blooded and dishonest attempt as a party move, to drive Mr. Whitney out of power and put Mr. Rowell in office.

A Minister is a Citizen. These statements, from centre to circumference, I feel bound to question seriously and respectfully. In the first place, a minister is a man and a citizen, and has his rights. Then, neither Rowell nor Whitney was by any means uppermost in the minds of those speakers, but, on the other hand, their quarrel was with what, after the long and cruel experience of the centuries, they with truth and justice called the "accursed liquor traffic." What sort of a party move? It was appeared plainly enough in Rowell's offer to join ranks with the government to stop treating, abolish the bar, or otherwise remedy the evils of the traffic. Sir James does not in his manifesto seem to carry even a slight recognition of the situation that there might after all be such a thing in the world as a moral conflict, a battle for sobriety, truth and righteousness, a terrible struggle for the welfare and rights of universal manhood, the protection of womanhood and childhood, for home and native land. You would think that belongs to the people who deny the existence of wrong and evil amongst us, and takes apparent success, prosperity of popular applause as the salve of the conscience if such exists, and the test of what they wish to be thought right. This stands asunder, toto celo, from the attitude, spirit, intent and effort of the men whom, as a partisan, he denounces as "demagogic clergy."

Courageous Clergy. Many of them and their life and labors I know personally; and of this I am confident that never before have they risen to greater clearness of perception, grander strength of purpose and the heights of an honorable courage that shone forth so distinctly in this conflict. Not for a moment was it to put Whitney out and Rowell in, except as Whitney and Rowell were the representatives and playthings of forces tossed about by the God of forces, as Daniel, the prophet in Babylon, calls him; not for a moment was the sin or urgent desire of these gospel ministers to effect such a change for party purposes; but that they might by Rowell or Whitney, or by

whom they could and as they could, deliver our land and our people from the curse and disgrace of the ruinous traffic. Such is the venture and the effort that demands the highest and the noblest in man, the strongest, purest, bravest, of which he is capable. Such vindicate their right to be regarded as the most faithful and safest leaders of the people, who, alas, often exalt the baser principles and set on high unworthy men to follow and to honor.

Whitney and Rowell will find their own places, but this battle must rage alone to the height of triumph or sink into the pit of despair. In the government of the great God mighty empires of ancient times went down through their lawlessness and idolatries. Are we sure we are exempt? One true thing Mr. Whitney did say: "Again the people of Ontario have placed upon me a tremendous load of obligation to them. Not perhaps to them so much as to God and country and this human race. What a glorious opportunity he has, an opportunity equal at least to the obligation. Said Mordecai, the Jew, to Esther, 'Ananias! Hebrew queen, in the hour of the Jew's danger: 'Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?' May I apply the question to our time and our rulers?"

AT THE POLICE COURT

SON WAS CHARGED WITH ABUSING HIS MOTHER.

Two Heavy Fines Imposed in Liquor Case—Young Woman Vagrant Given Twelve Hours to Leave City.

When John Shannon stood up in the police court on Monday morning his mother Sophia Shannon accused him of assaulting her but afterwards she stated that he did not assault her but that he merely threatened. This put a different side to the question and the magistrate let the son down with a fine of \$3 and costs or ten days. The mother said that he had been drinking and that this was the cause of the trouble.

This row at the Shannon home occurred about 7 o'clock Sunday night. At midnight the police received a second call to the house, this time to arrest a young woman named Mabel Hemming on a charge of vagrancy. Constable Naylon testified against the accused, and she was given twelve hours to leave the city. She said her home was in Brockville.

Mrs. Edith Willis admitted being drunk while a member of the "prohibited list" and declared that Karl Goldman, who boards at the same house, had given it to her. Goldman stoutly denied the charge but the magistrate disposed of the case by imposing a fine of \$20 and costs or one month on both Mrs. Willis and Goldman. Two drinks were fined and another was given a chance.
