SOME OF THEM "ACTED UP" ON MONDAY NIGHT.

And it was 1.10 a. m. before City Council Adjourned—No Summer Vacation Yet.

There were "wags on the green" in the city council chamber on Monday night when the city fathers took five hours to get through the business before them. More than three hours were occupied with the paving question. Ald. Graham was after the chairman of the Board of Works and the mayor, while Ald. Nickle came in to clashes with Ald. Fair, each paying his "respects" to the other. A lot of time was lost in arguments over minor details.

The discussion ended as anticipated before it began, viz., the adoption of the proposal to pave Princess street referring back of the proposal to lay sheet asphalt on residential streets. When the council got through with the by-laws and motions it was 1.10 a. m.

The mayor had a trying time to keep his flock in order and to retain enough of them after midnight to pass some money by-laws that required seventeen votes. Ald. Graham took offence at the mayor for ruling out of order a paving amendment he wanted to move to the Board of Works report. His worship said it could come up under motions, but Ald. Graham was not satisfied, and left the council chamber very wrathfully.

The council had expected to adjourn for the summer vacation, but owing to the residential paving question being unsettled it was decided to hold another regular meeting.

It was decided to expend \$100 for the entertainment of the cadets in camp at Barrieffield.

At the request of Aids. Sutherland and Hoag, the finance committee will consider the question of taking up the option on the old Fralick driving park in Williamville.

On motion of Aids. Sutherland and Hoag, a committee consisting of the mover and seconder and Aid. Harrison was appointed to consider the question of collecting all waste paper in the city for the purpose of selling it, and also to consider the advisability of establishing an incinerating plant for the city's garbage.
