# LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.  
Toronto Stock Yards, June 6.—Receipts were liberal, 150 cars, 2,200 cattle, 1931 hogs, 777 sheep and lambs, 203 calves.  
Cattle—The market for good to choice cattle was strong at last Thursday's prices; common and medium cattle as well as cows were easier by 12c to 15c and in some instances 25c per cwt. lower. Choice butcher's steers, \$8.30 to \$8.65; good butcher's steers, \$8.00 to \$8.30; medium butcher's steers, \$7.50 to \$7.90; common butcher's steers, \$7.20 to \$7.45; choice butcher's heifers, \$8.00 to \$8.25; common butcher's heifers, \$7.50 to \$7.75; choice cows, \$6.50 to \$7.00; good cows, \$6.00 to \$6.40; canners, \$3.00 to \$4.50.

Feeders and stockers.—Market steady. Choice steers, \$6.75 to \$7.00; medium steers, \$6.50 to \$6.75; stockers, \$6.00 to \$6.25. Milkers and springers.—Not many on sale at \$50 to \$55 each; bulk sold at \$60 to \$70 each.  
Calves.—Receipts not equal to the demand, with prices still firm. Choice veals, \$10.00 to \$10.50; new milk fed, \$11.00.

Sheep and lambs.—Receipts were larger, sheep fairly steady, and lambs sold lower \$11.00 per cwt. being the top price. Sheep, \$5.25 to \$6.00; ewes and rams, \$3.50 to \$5.00; spring lambs, \$9.50 to \$10.75 and a few at \$11.00; yearlings, \$7.50 to \$8.00.  
Hogs.—There were 1,931 reported, but 1,700 of these were western hogs consigned to Swift Canadian company, leaving about 200 on sale which was not enough to supply the demand. Selected fed and watered \$8.25 and \$8.00, f. o. b. cars and \$8.50 weighed off cars, and in one instance \$8.50 fed and watered was laid for a special few.
