

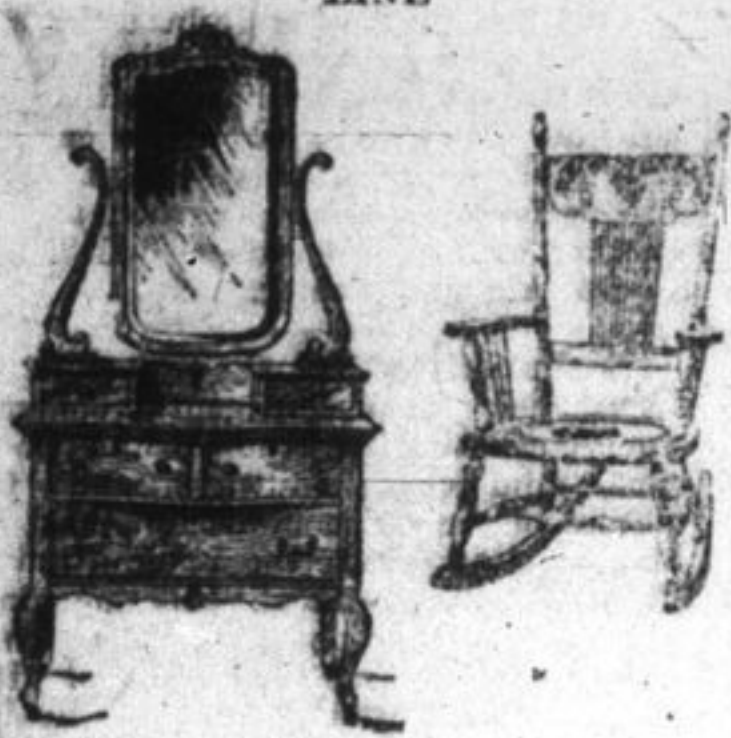

STRICKEN WITH HEART FAILURE.

Sad Death of Elliott Dunlop at Woodstock.

The deceased was an Anglican in religion. The funeral will be held at ten o'clock Thursday morning from her late home, Alfred street, to Cataract cemetery. The services will be conducted by Rev. R. S. Forneri, of St. Luke's church.

ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

DAVID GREEN, BUCK LAKE, WAS PLACED UNDER ARREST.

Told Constables That He Would Have Shot Them Had He Known What They Wanted Him for.

David Green, aged sixty, residing at Buck Lake, near Bedford Mills, is locked up at the police station on a very serious charge, preferred by his daughter. He was placed under arrest early on Wednesday morning, at his home, by City Constable Marshall Armstrong and County Constable Robert Smith, and brought to the city shortly before noon. The accused will be arraigned in the police court on Thursday morning, and will be remanded for a few days in order that the crown will have time to secure evidence. The arrest was made as the result of information which came to the ears of J. L. Whiting, K. C., crown attorney.

The constables left Kingston on Tuesday, and in all had a sixty mile drive to get their man. The accused had the reputation of being a desperate man, so they went prepared, each being armed with a revolver, and it was well that they were armed, as after his capture Green declared that if he had known that the two men were constables and that they were about to place him under arrest on such a charge he would have shot them.

The constables arrived at Bedford Mills on Tuesday evening and remained over night at a home close by the house occupied by Green, going to latter's home in the morning. Knowing that the man would put up a fight or probably flee to the woods, the constables set a trap for him and he walked into it. Green is employed as a guide for fishermen and hunters and the two constables under the ruse that they were on a fishing trip and wanted a guide had Green take them from his home across Buck Lake. After making the trip across the lake, the accused was told what he was wanted for, and the handcuffs were placed on him. Green looked up quite a fuss, and in spite of his age put up a lively "scrap" but of course had no show with the two constables. He declared that he was innocent of the crime charged against him. It is alleged that he got a tip that a warrant was out for his arrest, and that for several nights he has been sleeping near his front door with a rifle and revolver handy in case an effort should be made to place him under arrest. He has a family of eleven children, and has lived around Buck Lake all his life.

AN OPEN AIR DOG SHOW

TO BE HELD IN MACDONALD PARK ON THE 27TH.

In Connection With the Old Boys' Entertainment—Kingston Kennel Club to be Revived.

The Kingston Kennel Club is to be revived. Its resurrection will be marked by the holding of an open air dog competition in Macdonald Park on the afternoon of the civic holiday, July 27th, in connection with the Old Boys' entertainment. These open air exhibitions are popular in the old country, and Kingston dog fanciers are not going to allow this old burg to be behind.

Classes and prizes will be arranged, and there will be no entry fee. Everybody having a dog will be invited to take it down to Macdonald Park and share in the "festivities." Kingston has a large number of good dogs, and a splendid showing should be made on this occasion. A ring will be roped off for the exhibition. Competent judges will be selected.

WILL BE A GOOD STREET.

New Walks Will Do Much For Upper William Street.

It seems that nearly all the residents of Upper William street petitioned last year for the removal of the trees on that thoroughfare so that concrete walks could be laid, and to widen the roadway and give more light. Splendid shade trees had to be raised, but in time smaller trees will spring up in their places. A few years ago George street had to part with a whole row of magnificent shade trees so a concrete walk could be laid.

Upper William street is forty feet wide. Walks, four feet six inches in width are being laid. The roadway will be twenty-six feet wide, as wide as it is proposed to make any of the roads of the city to be paved in future. The block can gradually be improved by the erection of new houses a little further back from the line of street.
