THOUSAND ISLAND PARK.

Resumes Talk About Replacing Columbian Hotel.
Thousand Island Park, July 8.—There is strong agitation at Thousand Island Park for the construction of a large new fireproof hotel. While nothing definite has as yet been given out, it is understood that work will be commenced on a new structure early this fall.

Several plans for financing the hotel proposition have been advanced since the movement started. One is that the building should be constructed by the Thousand Island Park Association, as was the former policy. It is hardly thought, however, that this will be done. Another method which has been suggested is that a stock corporation be formed, independent of the association but in which members of the association could take stock if they so desired. This plan has found much favor.

At the same time that the new hotel boom has been re-started, the rumor has once more cropped up that a large corporation, such as the New York Central or the Richelieu and Ontario navigation division of the Canadian Steamship Lines is trying to arrange for the erection of the hotel.

Should a new hotel be built at Thousand Island Park, it would probably occupy the same site as the Columbian, although perhaps, it might be moved a little nearer the river front. It would be a concrete building following the general scheme of new park buildings. It would be

rather low but would extend over large area.

Plans for such a building were drawn up late last summer by men back of a proposition, but no building operations were begun.

An amusement parlor has been opened in the second floor of the new general building by J. Wilson, of Tampa, Fla. Mr. Wilson is pushing a movement for the erection of a dance hall and general amusement building on the water front. He hopes to have such a building at the resort next summer.
