PLUMBERS COMMENTS

ON WATERWORKS' LEAKS AND OTHER CIVIC MATTERS.

Suggestion That the Fire Department Wagons Should be Equipped With Better Lights.

The following communication has been received from the local plumbers' union, No. 221:

Found in Calgary, oil, in large quantities.

A great thing for western Canada, and a still better thing for those who own the properties. But the best discovery of late in this vicinity is the leaks in the city water system, which have been advertised at 2,000 gallons in a day.

It is queer that this very large waste of water had not been detected and repaired long ago.

We wonder who claims the honor of this great discovery. He certainly is worthy of a handsome purse of gold, which certainly would be freely given him by the many ratepayers who will profit so much by his discovery.

To many readers it is a great surprise to know that any water in the past had been wasted, but to the Plumbers' Union, No. 221, the great surprise is that even at this late date any notice is being taken of the leaks.

Of course it has gone about to the limit, but had the pump been kept up the supply no doubt any one a thought, or even if the department had been able to finance the purchasing of a larger pump, which had been suggested and recommended long ago, the many leaks would be still running.

This one of the gains caused by the stringency of money.

We commonly read in the daily papers and hear on the streets of how quiet things are in Kingston. A few years ago before the price of real estate started to advance in Kingston, the City Council thought it a good investment to buy its own quarters, and so invested several thousand dollars of the taxpayers' money into a couple of small sections of fine stone, which in the meantime has been pretty well used up.

Now this year we read where the council is giving very valuable beds of stone away providing the space is filled again to a certain level. This, we think, ought to keep a certain bunch quiet for a while.

Then the giving of the surplus moneys taken from Princess and King streets to the levelling up of the government grounds, while many city streets need such material very badly, surely will quiet some others.

We see where the fire and light committee have suggested that funds be provided as usual to send the chief to a convention. Their idea, no doubt, is to get him posted on all new devices for fighting fires and allow him to get all the latest ideas known. Well, if council sees fit to provide funds for such a purpose we would suggest that some of the officers of the other civic departments be sent where they could get pointers, too.

Some time ago we read where some street corners had been reported by the fire chief as being dark and dangerous for night runs for the fire brigade and suggested that electric lights be placed at these corners. Since, lights have been placed at the corners referred to, we cannot see why he doesn't ask for a better lighting system to be placed on each fire belonging to the department and thus have good light all the way along the journey.—Yours, LOCAL 221.
