TO CONSIDER PAVING

BOARD OF WORKS TO MEET THIS AFTERNOON.

What Will the Residential Streets Get?—King Street West Residents Choked With Dust.

The Board of Works is to meet this afternoon to once again take up the question of road paving in the residential districts. At the last meeting of the City Council, the board recommended that the tender of Foley and Gleason to lay sheet asphalt with concrete base, be accepted. The opinion of the majority of council seemed to be that a cheaper kind of pavement should be chosen, as they felt that \$125,000 for 30,000 square yards was a little too "steep" for the residential area.

Members of the Board of Works do not know what they will do in regard to the matter. Aids Cooper and O'Connor want a cheaper pavement than sheet asphalt, and a couple dollars of the board may fall in line with them. Larvia or romac on macadam base are talked of. The cost would be about one-half of that of sheet asphalt.

Oiling the Roadways.

While they are glad that the awful dust which they are afflicted with is to be got rid of by oiling the roadway with tarvia, some residents of King street west are not rejoicing over the cost that they will have to foot. The oiling will cost twenty cents a lineal foot frontage this year, and perhaps half of that next year. A person with a property frontage of thirty feet will pay \$6 for relief from dust for the rest of the season. The roadway has first to be swept cleanly before it can be oiled.

King street vegeters were in agony on Sunday night with the terrible dust that automobiles sent flying about. They cannot understand why the civic authorities do not catch a few of these law violators. One resident told the Whig that an automobile dashed along past the breakwater at a rate of sixty miles an hour. He and others tried in vain to catch the car number, but it was going too fast to get it.

If a policeman was detailed for duty on King street west on Sunday afternoon and evening, five or six hundred dollars in fines would come into the city coffers next day.
