THE HIGHWAY SCHEME

OF ONTARIO COMMISSION IS NOW TAKING SHAPE.

Traffic Census-Takers Will Visit Cities to Determine Roads Which Civic Councils Must Maintain. Toronto, June 11th.—The programme of the Ontario Highway Commission is rapidly taking shape, and officials expect that by the end of the summer preliminary construction plans will be sent out on the roads.

The staff of census takers will be supplemented as occasion demands by a chief officer who will be at commission headquarters to tabulate reports for final consideration.

One of the aims of the commission in sending out the motor survey parties and the new traffic experts is to educate city and country councils, as well as farming communities, in the real purpose of the government enterprises.

As far as actual construction in the province is concerned, activities this summer will be slight, the energy of the regular government department and the commission merging towards the one end.
