belief that Calgary will hardly prove an oil centre, and I do not think that New York, July 11 .- Says a corre- the oil fields to the south of that city will ever turn out to be oil producers. The one great obstacle in the way of oil-not gas, but crude oil-ever being produced in pay quantities, is the formation of the country. The formation is bad for the production of oil. It is too much of a fractured rock country, which is a poor sign at the outset. If the country were less fractured I would have more faith in it anada needs crude oil very badly, and I believe that if it is discovered in paying quantities it will be in the Peace River district, away up north of Edmonton. Anyone who has studied the oil problem knows that there has been oil in many parts of Alberta for generations, but whether there is sufficient to make it worth while to go to the expense of drilling for it is a different matter. If you have read anything about the life of Mackenzie, the explorer, you will remember that he discovered oil floatng on the surface of the river.

"We want oil, not gas. There is gas in Southern Alberta. What has been discovered recently appears to b just a wet gas, a light-colored and amber-colored gasoline, but that become excited about oil which has the stock of companies which hardly have one chance in a hundred of makmost unfortunate that there should be so much dreaming on the possibility of finding oil. It is bad for the country. These dreamers are apt to lose their money. If reports are to be accepted, they are not buying crude


