



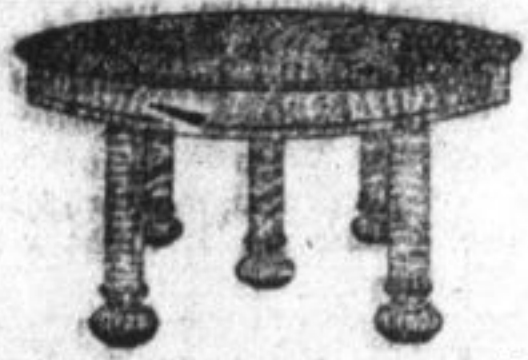

CAR TRACKS ALL LAID

FOR THE PRINCESS AND KING STREET PAVING.

The Work Completed on Wednesday — The Surface Paving Will Now be Rushed.

The laying of the new car track on Princess street will be completed this afternoon. There are now six blocks of one of the best laid double tracks in Ontario, on Princess street from Clergy to King, and along King to Brock street. The rails are all of the ninety pound size, or as heavy as is regularly used by the railroads. Five weeks ago the work of tearing up the old track was begun and in the short length of time they, new track has been laid. The gang usually numbered between ten and fifteen men. Foreman M. Lowery deserves great credit for the quick and thorough manner in which the new tracks have been laid.

The work of paving will now proceed with rapidly, and Princess street should be open to traffic in three weeks.

The new lights will not likely be put in operation until the street is finished, so that the citizens may have a big jubilation. The Bell Telephone company is still prevented from taking down its poles by reason of being unable to secure one more easement. If provision cannot be made for this, the remainder of the poles will be removed and those on one block will evidently have to remain.

Kingston and vicinity is rejoicing in splendid summer weather. For a week or so it has been hot, but real summer weather is always that way. 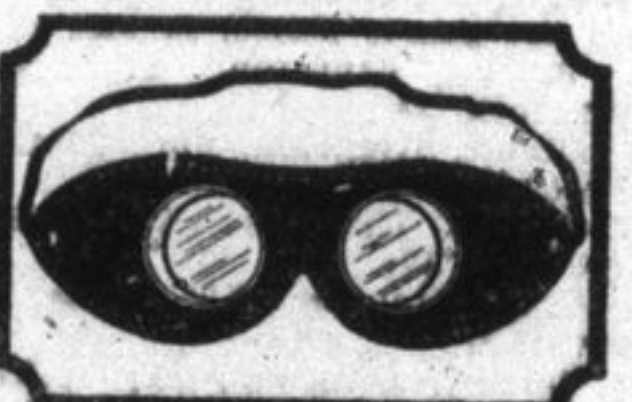
SPEEDING ON STREET.

The horse was cleaned and led after six o'clock, but at seven o'clock it was dead. The animal was valued at \$200. It looks as if some one did the poisoning on purpose, and though the owner would not say anything of his suspicions, he remarked to the Whig that he had been advised to be careful of where he left his horses.

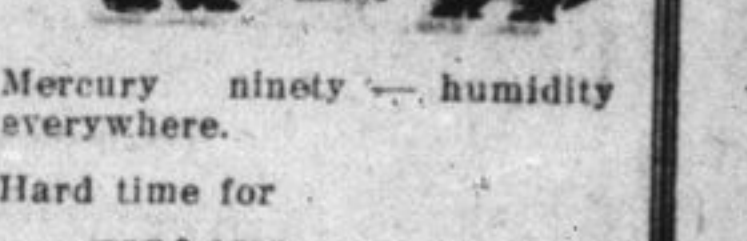
