At Evergreen Valley. Evergreen Valley, July 13.—Farmers report a fair crop of hay.

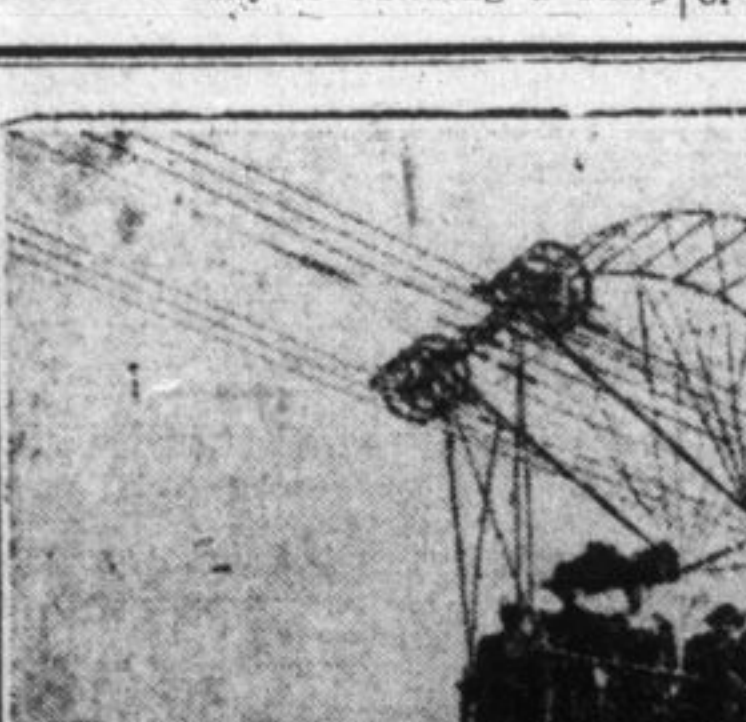
Notes From Wilbur. Wilbur, July 14.—Blue berry picking is the order of the day and everyone reports a good crop.

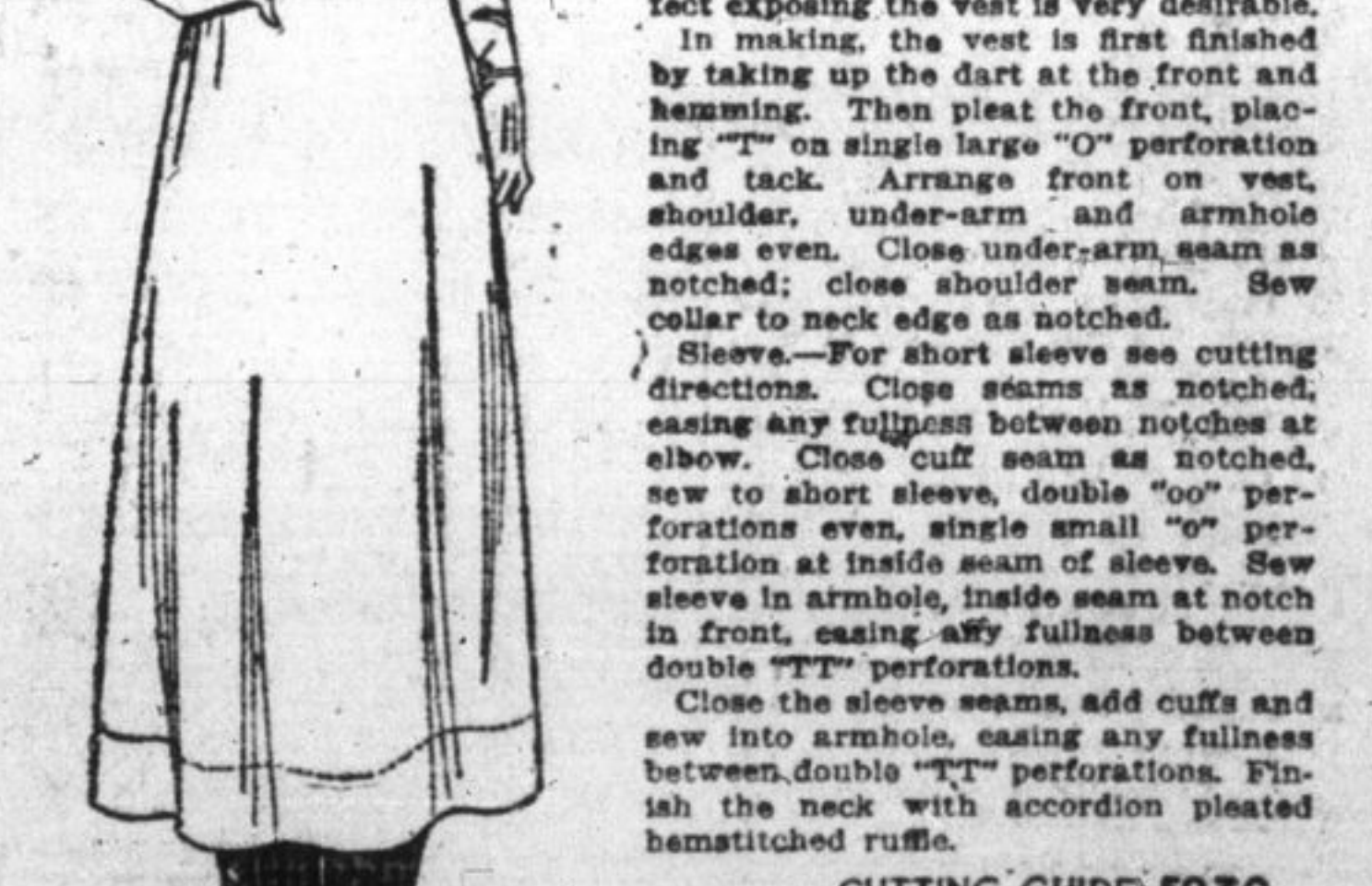
