FOR THE OLD BOYS

VERY MODEST PROGRAMME FOR THE CIVIC HOLIDAY.

The Street Fair Will Not be Held, as Railway Arrangements Could Not be Made.

Kingston's celebration on the Civic Holiday in honor of the homecoming of the "Old Boys" will be of modest dimensions. It was thought that the City Council would do something real grand this year, but the programme, as announced on Friday night, will include only two baseball matches, a dog show and a band concert. It was expected that the Ferris street fair would be held, but railway arrangements could not be made and this feature was therefore cancelled.

Next Saturday the old boys excursions will be met in the usual way. On Sunday evening, a band concert will be given in Macdonald park. On Monday morning, there will be a baseball match on the cricket field between Pontiac and Victorias, and in the afternoon at Lake Ontario park between the Havana colored students and the winners of the morning game.

The open air dog show will likely be held in Macdonald park in the morning. So far, forty-three entries have been made, and it is expected that 100 Kingston bow-wows will present themselves for exhibition on this occasion.

The day will close with a band concert in Macdonald park, and the City Council should at least illuminate the park as was done on Victoria night.

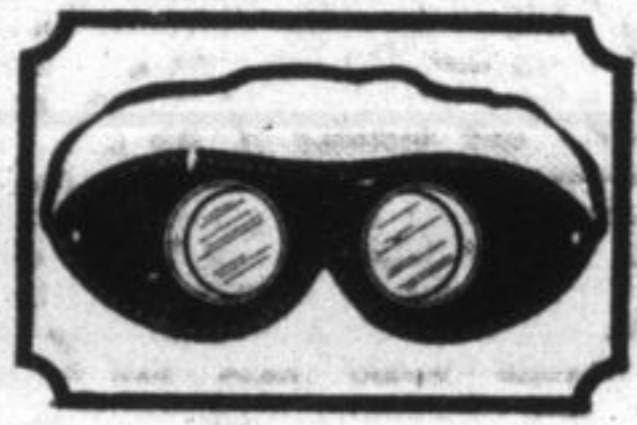
Another man who was charged with being drunk was taxed \$1 and costs, while still another drunk was given a chance.

Saturday's Market Prices.

There was a good-sized market on Saturday. The principal change in price was in new potatoes which dropped from 50c to 30c a peck. Butter is up a little, selling from 28c to 31c a pound. The other prices are: peas, 15c a quart; eggs, 23c a dozen; cabbage and cauliflower, 5c each; currants, two boxes for 15c; cherries, \$1 a basket; raspberries, 15c a box; beets, 5c a bunch; cucumbers, 5c each; tomatoes, 15c a box.
