

There was a good-sized market on Saturday. The principal change in price was in new potatoes which dropped from 50c to 30c a peck Butter is up a little, selling from 28c to 31c a pound. The other prices are: peas, 15c a quart: eggs, 23c a dozen; cabbage and cauli flower, 5c each; currants, two boxes for loc; cherries, \$1 a basket; raspberries, 15c a box; beets, 5c a bunch: cucumbers, 5c each: tomatoes, 15c a box.
