MRS. CARMAN DENIES THAT SHE WAS JEALOUS OF HER HUSBAND.

She Was Just "Curious" - Out on Bail the Suspected Slayer Goes on Tour With Family.

New York, July 20.-District Attorney Lewis J. Smith announced that his office is working on new evidence in the Mrs. L. Bailey murder case, with a view to having it submitted to another jury with the object of an indictment for first degree murder. Just what this evidence is the district attorney would not say. Neither would he divulge the time when this evidence would be submitted. Plans for the immediate future occupied the attention Saturday of Mrs. Florence Carman who on Friday was released from the county jail at Mineola in \$20,000 bail. Dr. Edwin Carman, and daughter Elizabeth, and Mrs. Carman, planned to start to-day on an automobile tour to Philadelphia, Atlantic City, and Delaware water gap. The Carman's expect to be gone about a month, spending a part of the time on their farm near the Delaware water gap.

In a statement Mrs. Carman told for the first time her story. She said that it was not true that she was "insanely jealous, as the newspapers lead people to believe." She explained she was merely curious, saying "the fact of the matter is that I had been on numerous occasions with my husband at various affairs, and had many a good time with him. But on such occasions people would rant him about his 'many girls.' I simply made up my mind to find out what was the truth in those remarks, not because I was insanely jealous, but because I wanted to find out—I was curious."

GIFT FOR CARDINAL

Woman Leaves \$282,055 to Archbishop of Baltimore. Baltimore, July 20.-Cardinal Gibbons, as archbishop of Baltimore, will receive \$282,055 under the will of Eliza Andrews, a Baltimore woman noted for her philanthropy. The administration account has just been paid by the orphan's court. The value of the entire estate is \$721,544.20. Of the amount which will go to the archbishop of Baltimore, \$279,336 is in various securities and \$2,659 in cash. Mrs. Andrews made many bequests to Catholic charities and educational institutions. The large bequest to Cardinal Gibbons will be devoted by him to charities of the archdiocese.

Sir Edward Clarke Retires.

London, July 20.-There was a notable gathering at the bar at Lincoln's Inn at a banquet tendered to Right Hon. Sir Edward Clarke, the noted lawyer, who is retiring after fifty years' practice. Among the guests were the lord high chancellor, the attorney general and the lord chief justice. Sir Edward Clarke has handled some notable cases and has acted general from 1886 to 1892. He was counsel in the trial of Dr. Jameson, and was also in the buccarar case. He has written a number of works on law and other subjects. He was born in 1841 and was admitted to the practice of law at Lincoln's Inn in 1864.

Exporting Grain.

It costs about eleven cents to ship a bushel of grain from Duluth, Minn., to Liverpool, England. This is the service supplied for that eleven cents: Grain is loaded into a steamship at Duluth through an elevator. It is taken from the steamship by an elevator at Buffalo, cleaned, dried, and loaded into a freight car. It is hauled 435.5 miles by rail in Philadelphia, where it is again elevated out of a freight car, weighed, dried, stored until a ship is ready, and loaded into a steamship, which takes it to Liverpool, 3,000 miles across the Atlantic ocean.

Another Baby Victim

Stratford, July 20.-Irene, the three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Edmunds, Nile street, died on Friday of sulphur-poisoning, despite the efforts of attending physicians to save the child's life. Mrs. Edmunds found little Irene with a match minus the head. Later the child was seized with vomiting spells. Rushed to the hospital two doctors worked for several hours, over her, but were unable to overcome the effects of the poison. The little victim's father is "Toad" Edmunds, the noted hockey player and referee.

Newspaper War Goes to Courts.

London, Ont., July 20.-The London Advertiser, the local liberal organ, has instituted a \$50,000 libel action against the London Free Press conservative, for alleged blackguardly attacks for some time past, and demands a complete retraction of certain statements published.

Has Grandmother Record.

Valparaiso, Ind., July 20. - Mrs. Peter Curtiss claims the distinction of being the youngest great-grandmother in Indiana. She is only fifty-four years old. She was a grandmother at thirty-four years.

May Run in England.

Montreal, July 20.-Major George Washington Stephens, the former chairman of the Montreal Board of Harbor Commissioners, who was defeated on April 6th by Mederic Martin in his race for the mayoralty, may be a candidate for the English House of Commons.

CONTINUED DRY SPELL.

Hicks Cannot See as Abundant Rains as Are Desired.

A reactionary storm period is central on the 20th, 21st, and 22nd of July. The moon is at greatest declination north on the 20th, and in conjunction with the earth and the sun, at new moon, on the 22nd. This period will bring great depression of the barometer and extremely high temperature—a time when a "heat wave" will reach a climax which will rise above already heated atmospheric conditions natural for July. The wisecracker will tell you that "anybody can predict warm weather in July," but they will not undertake to tell when you may look for the warmest weather, or the time when summer heat will rise into a prolonged crisis. Blustering storms of rain and thunder will be natural on and next to the 21st and 22nd, but rains will not be as abundant and general as will be desired. If crops are kept thoroughly cultivated and free from grass and weeds, they will stand a marked "shortage" in rainfall, at this season; but woe to the fields that are unweeded, that have no touch of the "dry farming." Rising barometer and cooling winds may come about the 23rd to 25th.

The second seismic period in July is central on the 22nd, covering the 19th to the 26th. The seismic unrest of this last period may continue beyond the 26th, up to the last days of July.—HICKS.

After an illness extending over four months, the death occurred at the general hospital on Saturday evening about 7.15 o'clock of Captain David Luther Donnelly. Deceased had been in the hospital since the latter part of May. Acute Bright's disease was the cause of death.

Deceased was born on Garder Island, and was a son of Captain John and Elizabeth Donnelly. He moved from Garder Island to Kingston and learned the plumbing trade with McKelvey & Birch. Later on he engaged in the wrecking work with the Donnelly wrecking company. He was unmarried, and thirty-nine years of age. Deceased was of a jovial disposition, well-liked by his many friends and the news of his death was learned with sincere regret by all. In marine circles where he was best known, he was held in high esteem. He was an Oddfellow. Besides his brothers and one sister, Capt. John Donnelly and Foster Donnelly, of Kingston, Sandford Donnelly, of Toronto, and Mrs. M. McCormack of Kingston.

Latest Tidings From All Over the World.

High Japanese officials have been sent to prison for forgery and bribery. The Panama canal will be opened to commercial traffic on July 31st. Five vessels were lost on the Nova Scotia coast in a storm. A twelve-foot waterway between Montreal and New York is proposed. Hak Walters, the well-known Ottawa sportsman, suicided. The St. John, N.B., Globe calls on Premier Fleming to resign. A relief expedition failed to reach the Beakuk crew in the Arctic. Philip Snowden, labor leader, predicts a big English railway strike. Nine men and boys were drowned in six places in Ontario over the weekend. Teachers of the empire will hold an imperial conference in Toronto next year. W. McDonald's majority in North Bruce has been increased on a recount from four to seven. The king has called a conference of leaders of all parties on Irish home rule. F. L. Ruddy, Toronto, was elected president of the American Poster Association. A police report that many employees in Toronto are unable to collect their wages. A four-story building at Northampton, Mass., fell in, injuring several persons. The name of Phil Rowyer is being prominently suggested as a successor to the late Senator Coffey in the upper house. There are four vacancies in the senate in Ontario. At Danbury, Conn., eleven hundred dozen hats ready for shipment, valued at \$13,500, were destroyed by fire. At Tamworth it is thought Miss Blanche Yorkie may be hiding or drowned. Thomas J. Moore, a farmer at Richardson, Sask., will apply to parliament for divorce from his wife Lydia Lee Moore, now of Calgary. Chicago police are looking for a man concerned in a revolver fight when a detective was killed and three others wounded.
