WAS BADLY SCALDED

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT TO BELL-BOY ON STEAMER SYRACUSE.

Turned on Steampipe in Mistake for Water Pipe - When Steamer Reached Kingston He Was Taken to General Hospital.

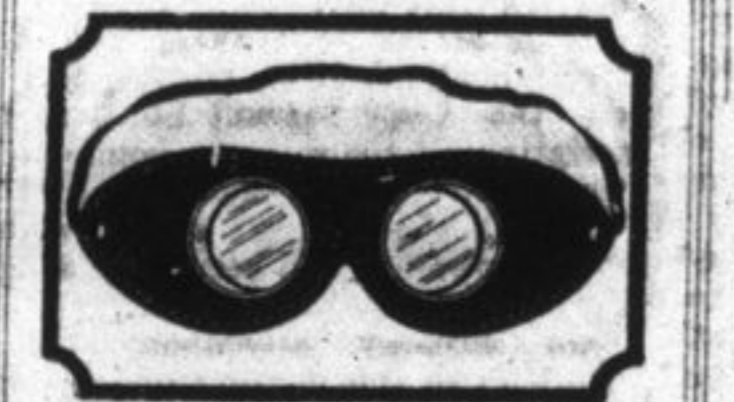
A terrible accident, which may prove fatal, befell Herbert Miller, a bell-boy on the steamer Syracuse. Going into the toilet-room to take a bath some time during the early hours of Monday evening, while this boat was en route to Kingston, young Miller turned on the steampipe in mistake for the waterpipe. In an instant the steam enveloped him and badly scalded him about the arms, legs and face. He was alone at the time, but his screams brought some of the crew to his assistance.

The lad was scalded so badly that he was unable to walk and had to be carried to one of the staterooms, where everything was done to allay the excruciating pain. Here he remained all night until the steamer landed in Kingston, early on Tuesday morning. James Reid's ambulance was summoned to be in readiness at the wharf when the boat arrived, and the unfortunate lad was rushed with all haste to the general hospital. At this institution he was attended by Dr. G. W. Mylks, who rendered assistance and relief to the pretty well-exhausted boy.

Young Miller is in a bad condition, but hopes are held out for his recovery.

The city very kindly donated seventy-five prize badges, and others have been donated by a number of prominent citizens.

Ald. Peters, on behalf of the Spratt Dog Food company, has donated a twenty-five pound bag of dog biscuits as a special prize.

On Wednesday night there will be a meeting of the committee and the judges to make the final arrangements for the show. Quite a large number of women are taking an interest in the show, having made entries, and will take their dogs to the show to be judged.

A notable entry for the show is one which was sent to the Whig from a dog owner. It is for an English spaniel, the only one of its kind ever seen in this part of the country.

CITY LOSES \$700. No More Franchise Money From Bell Telephone Company.

Thanks to recent legislation by the Whitney government Kingston loses \$700 a year franchise money from the Bell Telephone company. The new legislation allows franchises to be given to telephone companies for not more than one year, which space of time is practically valueless to any concern. Hence, the Bell company does not require to pay anything for the franchise, for it is not worth anything.

ACTION WAS DEFERRED

BY CITY COUNCIL ON THE LEONARD PROPOSITION.

The Side of Queen's Authorities First to be Heard—The Matter Left in the Mayor's Hands.

Just before the City Council adjourned at midnight Monday, Mayor Shaw spoke of his conference last week with Major R. W. Leonard, with regard to his military residence offer to Queen's university, which had been withdrawn after the university authorities had persisted in being given the majority of members on the board of control.

His worship stated that Major Leonard was not unwilling to have the matter reopened, and he (the mayor) suggested that the council should try and act as mediator and have the university authorities again take up the proposition of Major Leonard, which would mean so much for Kingston.

Ald. Kent had a resolution prepared to authorize the Finance Committee to take up the matter with Queen's, but it was pointed out by one or two aldermen that there were two sides to the question, and that before the council took any action, the view of the Queen's board of trustees should be ascertained.

The matter was left in the hands of the mayor, who will make the necessary enquiries.

THE LATE HERMAN MCCREA

Died in Kingston on Sunday, Aged Eighty-Six.

The sad death occurred on Sunday afternoon, at the home of his son-in-law, Dr. R. K. Kilborn, King street, of Herman McCrea. Deceased was a native of Grenville county and was born on April 2nd, 1828. He was of United Empire Loyalist stock and was well-known all over the province.

The late Mr. McCrea was a man of sterling worth, integrity and of marked ability. He took an active part in the affairs of his native county, acting in different capacities in the council of the township and county in which he lived. In politics he was a liberal and a member of the liberal executive of Grenville county. He was a brother of the late Hon. W. McCrea. If he had been spared until the tenth of May next he would have been able to celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of his wedding.

He is survived by his widow, and six children: Mrs. (Dr.) R. K. Kilborn, of the city; Mrs. Bruce S. Weir, of Easton's Corners; Miss Grace, of Kingston; Dr. D. P. of Coakleton, N.Y.; Dr. H. H. of Port Jarvis, N. Y.; and W. A., druggist, of Hawkebury, Ont. Deceased was an Anglican in religion and a member of the Masonic order.
