For His Race in Kingston—Not Yet Decided If Queen's Will Have a New Rink This Year.

Issue seems to have been taken with regard to a paragraph in the Whig last week to the effect that the first professional race run by Duffy, of Hamilton, was in Kingston on the 3rd of June. Several weeks ago a Hamilton paper announced that Duffy had admitted taking money for his race in Kingston. The Whig asked the sporting editor of the Toronto Globe, who is in close touch with the C.A.A.U., why Duffy was professionalized, and he replied as follows:

"Duffy was disqualified as an amateur for demanding and receiving for competition in Kingston an amount so far beyond legitimate expenses as to make him a professional."

That should settle all dispute as to the reason for the disqualification of Duffy.

New Rink For Queen's.

It is still undecided whether Queen's will have a new rink for next winter. John Dawson, secretary of the athletic association, expects to be able to make a definite announcement in a couple of weeks. All depends upon the university board of trustees. If it advances the money, up will go the rink. There are two propositions before Mr. Dawson, from a Toronto concern. One calls for the erection of a wooden rink for \$15,000; the other for a structure of steel for \$20,000. If a contract can be let by the end of August, the rink would be in readiness by December 15th.

The government buoy-tender Reserve is expected at the Kingston Shipbuilding dry dock for new speed wheels at 10 a.m., Tuesday.

No freighters passed west over Sunday owing to the accident to the Lachine canal. A government dredge sank and it was necessary to tie up traffic in the canal to float her. As there is a shortage of ocean-going grain vessels in Montreal, nearly all of the Canadian grain carriers are in the Montreal harbor.
