MINISTER OF JUSTICE COULD NOT GET WORK IN BASEBALL CIRCLES

MAKING AN INSPECTION OF THE PENITENTIARY

With Regard to Prison Reform Commission's Recommendations—Will Hear Dismissed Guards' Complaints.

Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, arrived in Kingston from Ottawa during Tuesday night to make an inspection of the provincial penitentiary at Portsmouth. His coming was announced by the Whig two weeks ago.

It will be recalled that last session a report was submitted by an investigating commission recommending many internal changes in the penitentiary

and a general reform in the conduct and system of the penal institutions of the country. The matter is to be legislated upon next session, and Judge Doherty, before acting on the report, will personally visit the prisons. He has already inspected those in the west.

The minister will enquire into the recent dismissal of three penitentiary guards, owing to their being over the age limit when appointed. Others are over the age limit, and those dismissed think it unfair that they should be singled out. The minister will hear what they have to say.

POOR TOURIST YEAR.

And Steamer North King Comes Off Route.

The steamer North King was taken off the Charlotte, Kingston and Thousand Islands route on Wednesday. The steamer Caspian will continue on her run, calling here every other day. The steamer Syracuse may be taken off because of the poor tourist traffic, and the steamers Toronto and Kings-ton go on her run, calling at Charlotte as in previous years. The steamer North King has been in trouble all this year, arriving one day three hours late, as a result of a lack of steam.

The tourists this year all seem to be travelling in their own autos and not making the long boat trips as was the case of previous years. So far the traffic has been the poorest year since 1907, which was exceptionally sick.

The girl who comes from the vicinity of Portsmouth escaped from the home last week and made her way to Kingston. She was sent up about eighteen months ago. Since then she has been around her home, and causing trouble. For a time it was thought that the girl would reform but from her actions it does not appear as though she has.
