A. Y. P. A. CONFERENCE

TO BE HELD IN KINGSTON, AUG. 18TH TO 20TH.

Opening Session in The City Hall—The Programme That Has Been Arranged.

The A. Y. P. A. of Canada will meet in conference here on August 18th, 19th and 20th, at which it is expected delegates including prominent clergy and young people from all parts of Canada will be present. The opening session will be held in the City Hall on Tuesday, August 18th, at 8 o'clock. Addresses of welcome to the visitors will be delivered by the bishop of Ontario, Mayor Shaw, W. F. Nickle, M. P., and Dr. A. E. Ross, M.P.P. R. R. F. Harvey has charge of the musical programme for the evening.

The regular sessions will be held in St. George's hall on Wednesday and Thursday, August 19th and 20th and many topics of interest to all young people's societies will be dealt with. Among the delegates who occupy a prominent place on the programme are the Bishop of Huron, Rev. Prof. Wright, M.A., Rev. Canon McNab, Rev. J. C. Polls, of Clinton; William Moulton of Huron College, London; Clarence Bell, Osgoode Hall, Toronto, and A. W. Langmuir, president of the dominion A. Y. P. A. of Toronto.

The various local committees convened by Rev. C. K. Bourne, Rev. R. C. Magee, W. H. Dalby and Miss C. O'Hara are sparing no pains in their efforts to make the convention a great success. The visitors will be shown about the city and tendered an excursion among the Thousand Islands on Wednesday evening. The convention will be concluded by a service in St. George's cathedral on Thursday evening, followed by a farewell rally in the church hall.

English Teachers to Tour

Preparations are being made to welcome the English school teachers who are due in Montreal on Saturday, August 1st. The party is led by a member of the British house of commons, F. W. Goldstone, who is secretary of the National Union of Teachers, an association whose membership totals nearly 75,000. The visitors will arrive in Montreal on the S. S. Alunia and after being received at McGill university will take a 600-mile tour over the Grand Trunk lines, visiting Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton and Niagara Falls. They will spend two days in Algonquin Park, enjoying the fishing and boating around the Highland Inn, and will leave New York on their return to Great Britain on August 14th.

Cannot Do Anything
