DR. ROBINSON BLAMED FOR MISS YORKE'S DEATH

The Coroner's Jury at Tamworth Found That the Young Woman Died as the Result of an Illegal Operation For Abortion Performed by Him.

(By Staff Reporter.) Tamworth, July 31.—An illegal operation for abortion, performed by Dr. C. K. Robinson, caused the death of Miss Blanche ("Happy") Yorke, the pretty Tamworth dress-maker, whose body was found buried in Dr. Robinson's cellar on Tuesday night.

Such was the finding of the jury hearing the case, which has caused such widespread interest. The verdict was received at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon after ten hours had been spent in the hearing of evidence. The taking of evidence was concluded at 3.30 o'clock, and at 5 o'clock, the report was handed to Dr. C. H. Cowan, the coroner. The inquest opened on Wednesday afternoon, and after four sessions, in which a score or more witnesses were heard, the verdict was framed, which reads as follows:

"We your jury duly empaneled and sworn by Dr. C. H. Cowan, coroner for the county of Lennox and Addington, for the purpose of enquiring into the cause of death of Blanche Yorke, who died on or about the 8th day of July, 1914, find as follows: That the said Blanche Lillian Yorke came to her death some time during the night of July 8th, 1914, in the house occupied by Dr. C. K. Robinson, situated in the village of Tamworth, county of Addington. We also find that the death was caused by an illegal operation for abortion performed by Dr. C. K. Robinson."

No inquest in this district has held such keen interest as that of the Yorke inquest. The town hall has been packed with people at every session, and during the noon and half the jury had the case under consideration, quite a large crowd waited directly in front of the door to secure first news of the result. Five minutes after the verdict was known, it appeared to have floated all over the village.

Now that the inquest is over, the people are anxiously awaiting further developments, and are still on the quiver for any action which may be taken. Detective Greer left town last night for the west. Inspector Miller left town early yesterday morning. The fact that the cellar of Dr. Robinson's was searched by the police and nothing found, shortly after Miss Yorke's disappearance, has brought forth much unfavorable comment. The finding of the body after it was announced that a thorough search had been made, came as a big surprise.

The proceedings at the inquest yesterday afternoon were given a very sad touch when Daniel McGregor, the young farmer living at Croynedon, identified an opal ring exhibited by Coroner Cowan as an engagement ring he had given Miss Yorke. Another feature of the final session was the presence of Melville Robinson, Kingston, brother of Dr. C. K. Robinson, who asked for an adjournment of the inquest on the grounds that Dr. Robinson's relatives had not been given proper notification of the holding of the inquest.

Daniel McGregor's Story. Daniel McGregor, who kept company with Miss Yorke, said he had known her six years. He first became acquainted with her in July 1911. Witness then drove to her home but found she was not there. He then made inquiries in the village. He seen Dr. Robinson on the Saturday following Miss Yorke's disappearance, calling at the doctor's residence with Samuel Yorke.

Dr. Robinson said he was not sure if Miss Yorke had been at his office. On another occasion he went to the doctor's office with Samuel Yorke. This time Dr. Robinson said that Miss Yorke had been in his office fifteen or twenty minutes, and that she left his office about 8.30 or 9 o'clock. Witness identified two rings worn by the deceased. One ring bore the initials, "B. L. Y." and the other was an opal engagement ring.

Questioned by the crown attorney, the witness said he knew nothing about Miss Yorke's disappearance. He knew that she was securing medicine from Dr. Robinson. She had told him about this. Witness did not undertake to pay the expenses of an operation for Miss Yorke, nor was such a thing ever hinted to him. He was never in Dr. Robinson's office in his life, and never spoke to the doctor until July 12th.

On one occasion Dr. Robinson has stated to the witness that perhaps Miss Yorke was wandering around as a result of going out of her mind. "I asked the doctor if her case was serious," added Mr. McGregor, "and he said, 'no,' but that he had often heard of such cases." Detective Greer corroborated the finding of the body in the conditions. He had searched the furnace and had endeavored to scrape it out. Pieces of the bed tick were found in the furnace with corset steels.

Asked For Adjournment. Quite a surprise was given all concerned at this stage, when Melville Robinson, a brother of Dr. Robinson, asked that the proceedings be adjourned on the ground that the relatives of the doctor had not received proper notification of the inquest.

Crown Attorney Preston said that he objected most strenuously against any adjournment for a week. He stated that a copy of the evidence taken at the session of the inquest could be secured by any person desiring to represent any one at this inquest. Mr. Robinson declared he did not know the whereabouts of his brother, Dr. Robinson. Samuel Yorke, brother of Blanche Yorke, who has for the past year been living at Eldorado, in North Hastings, testified. He told of the disappearance of his sister, whom he called "Sis," and of the effort he had made to try and locate her. He went to the home of Mrs. Walsh, where the young woman had been engaged as dressmaker, but could get no clue. Mr. McGregor did not know the young woman's whereabouts. He expected to take Miss Yorke to a celebration at Deseronto on July 12th. Witness thought it was very queer if the doctor should fail to keep this appointment.

A. Brandon, W. G. Howes, C. G. Coxall, Edward Dawson, H. Richardson, J. A. Hunter. Mrs. Robinson, wife of Dr. C. K. Robinson, accompanied by other relatives of the doctor, made a trip out from Kingston to Tamworth yesterday afternoon in an automobile. As a result of the trip settlements were made for his furniture and other business matters.

Saw Dr. Robinson. The Whig was informed, on Friday, that a person, who was on the steamship America on July 16th, identified Dr. Robinson as one of the passengers. He was with two ladies, who had returned tickets. One of these ladies was described as being "a rather heavy woman," and the other a younger woman, wore a heavy veil.

REORGANIZATION CHANGES.

Number of Appointments on Canadian Northern Lines. According to a recent circular issued at the head offices of the Canadian Northern railway system at Toronto, the following lines have been designated as the Ontario grand division: Canadian Northern Ontario railway; Central Ontario railway; Bay of Quinte railway; Ironstone, Bancroft and Ottawa railway, and Brockville, Westport and North-Western railway.

The Ontario grand division is subdivided into the Toronto and Ottawa divisions, the latter subdivided into several districts, of which the Brockville district, Brockville to Westport, forms one. The Brockville district forms a portion of the Ottawa division. In the general reorganization of the road George Collins is appointed superintendent of the Ottawa division with headquarters at Trenton and with jurisdiction over the transportation, mechanical and maintenance of way department. W. J. Curle becomes superintendent of the Toronto division with headquarters at Toronto, with jurisdiction over the transportation, mechanical and maintenance of way departments.

The officers appointed for the Ottawa division are as follows: H. B. Sherwood, superintendent, with headquarters at Napanee; E. S. Derbyshire, assistant superintendent, Trenton; S. J. Kitchen, trainmaster, Trenton; E. Kyers, roadmaster, J. J. D. Evans, division engineer, Trenton; R. A. Miller, general foreman, Trenton; W. Walsh, supervisor of track, Trenton, jurisdiction over line Toronto-Napanee; O. Ogden, supervisor of track, Ottawa, jurisdiction over line Ottawa-Napanee and Brockville district; D. McDonald, supervisor of track, Trenton, jurisdiction over Central Ontario, Quinte and Kingston district; W. C. Moore, road foreman of engines, Trenton.
