Then, too, each wrapper contains a satin insert which has heretofore been packed only in cigarettes, and gives a man who likes his tobacco in chewing form a chance to become a collector on his own account. At any rate, the sanitary feature of separately wrapped plugs should prove a big success.

### FLOWER COMPANY FAILURE

Of Interest to Kingston—Family Involved Here.

The failure of Flower and Company has a significance to both Kingston and Watertown people. The Flower family were from Watertown and practically built that city, some of the members of the family living there at the present time. They started the big air-brake works there and other industries and gave many public improvements, parks, libraries, etc. Their failure will be a bad blow to Watertown.

For many years they had the controlling interest in the K. & P. railway from its construction up to the time it was taken over by the C. P. R., being particularly intimate with the Folger family. The station Flower, north of Sharbot Lake, is called after Ex-Governor Flower, and for many years one of the engines, used on the line, had the name Flower on it. They were also interested in the Ron mines on the K. & P. railway and M. J. Grady, Wellington street, looked after their interests.

A few years ago Governor Flower was very important in the stock markets. There was a big boom in stocks about ten years ago, called the "Flower boom," he being the head of the syndicate. Right in the midst of it one afternoon he dropped dead, deputy coast the "Flower panic," when stocks like New York Air-brake and Brooklyn Rapid Transit dropped over fifty points. This smash caused many failures in which some Kingston people lost their all. It has been said that if Governor Flower had lived for two weeks longer there would have been two or three more millionaires in Kingston.
