**IN ENDEAVOR TO LOCATE DR. C. K. ROBINSON.**

Inspector Miller Was in Watertown, N. Y., For a Couple of Days—Railway Men Are Being Interviewed.

Inspector John Miller, of the provincial police force, has been in Watertown, N.Y., a few days, following up clues in search of Dr. C. K. Robinson, wanted for the death of Miss Blanche York at Tamworth. He has been interviewing railway men in an endeavor to secure information as to the direction taken by the doctor after he arrived in Watertown.  
There was a report to the effect that Dr. Robinson had stopped at the Brownville hotel on the night of July 19th, but Inspector Miller worked on this report and could not get a clue. It is believed that Robinson lost his time in taking a train out of Watertown on the afternoon of his arrival and that he took one of the three evening trains to a larger city. The conductor and brakeman who were on the train out of Cape Vincent on the day in question, were shown a photograph of the missing doctor, but they were unable to recall any person being on the train that day who resembled the doctor.

**STICK PERCED HIS THROAT.**

Youngster Met With Painful Accident On Sunday.  
While playing in the yard on Sunday, "Jimmy", son of Alexander Stephen, King street west, fell while carrying a stick, and in the fall the stick went into his mouth, penetrating his throat. There was a stiff breeze blowing at the time and it was feared that the fire would spread. A couple of men from the Brock street station went to the scene and succeeded in extinguishing the fire.

**ACCIDENTS AT PETAWAWA**

To Several Members of the Horse Artillery.  
The batteries of the R.C.H.A., which arrived here on Monday morning, had to leave a number of their members at Petawawa on account of accidents. Corporal Bland, of "B" battery, was mounted on a horse that took fright and "went crazy" on Friday. The animal bolted and ran against a gun-carriage, threw Bland, knocking him unconscious for three hours. He was taken to the military hospital, and was much improved on Saturday.  
Driver Battel, also of "B" battery, met with an accident. He was driving the leading team on a gun when in a "charge" the team fell, throwing him on the ground and dislocated his collar-bone.  
Corporal Clarke, of "A" battery, was hurt by the recoil of a gun during the competitive firing on Friday. He was kneeling beside a gun and when he attempted to get away when the gun was fired his foot slipped and he received a painful blow on the face by the recoil. He was taken to the hospital.  
Gunner Simmons, of "A" battery, was driving a team on a gun when his horse bolted and threw him under the gun-limber, the front half of the gun-carriage. The wheels passed over him breaking three ribs. Sergt.-Maj. Bray, who on June 25th had his ankle smashed in the tent-pegging exercises, is improving rapidly.
