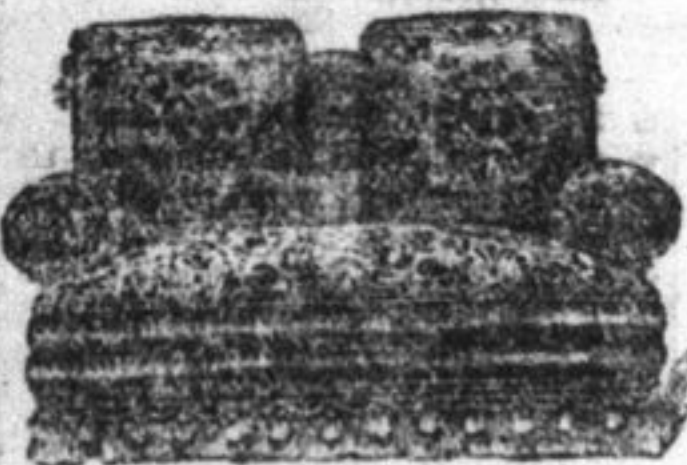

THE YACHT REGATTA

AT KINGSTON ON FRIDAY A. D. SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

The E. Y. R. A. Boats Will be Here—The Programme Prepared For the Two Days.

At 3.30 p.m. Friday, the annual regatta of the Kingston Yacht club will commence with a dinghy race for the local club boats.

The next race is at 4.00 p.m. an open motor boat race for every kind of motor boat except hydroplanes.

The next at 4.30 p.m. is a swimming race to the buoy and return.

The canoe race doubles will be open to any canoes except racing canoes. The start is at 4.45 p.m.

At 5 o'clock an open bang and go back motor boat race will commence. The canoe race single commences at 5.30 o'clock.

At 6 o'clock a swimming race from H. S. Folger's wharf, Emily street, to the club wharf, is scheduled. This is the last of the afternoon sports.

At 7 o'clock the third and final race of the Dr. J. J. Hartly trophy will be pulled off. This is one of the most interesting. It is for any two-cylinder motor boat owned in Kingston or Portsmouth.

On Saturday afternoon the E. Y. R. A. sailing yacht races will be pulled off. There are three divisions of cruisers. There will be boats for these races from the Crescent Yacht club, Watertown, Oswego, Cape Vincent and other places.

The Crescent Yacht club are sending over the "Ruth," owned by H. L. Vincent of Chatham. "The H," owned by L. W. Herriek of Chatham, the Neagha, Watertown Ontario and Crescent.

At 7.30 p.m. another bang and go back race is on the programme.

At 8.30 p.m. a programme calls for a dance and illumination.

DEVELOPMENT COMPANY

Takes Over Dock and Hotel at Fine View.

The dock and hotel property at Fine View has been purchased by the St. Lawrence River Development company, which was recently organized and will incorporate.

The officers of this company have been elected as follows: President George C. North of Syracuse; vice-president, T. H. Nunn, Fine View; secretary, Howard Gardner, Rochester; treasurer, G. W. Otis, Fine View. The organization is the result of a general desire of property owners at this place to have a new dock.

The hotel property was purchased from Chester F. Brant. The dock is being temporarily repaired and within a week boats of any size will be able to land.

The company also expects to secure a fire boat for the protection of property along the St. Lawrence river, and to secure a branch of the state road running to Clayton to the state road running to Fisher's Landing. A new family hotel and other amusements are contemplated also.

The advent of the new company was celebrated by a programme on the dock and a salute to all the boats which passed.

ASLEEP ON THE TRACK.

Edward Bradley, of Brockville, Rescued by Constable.
