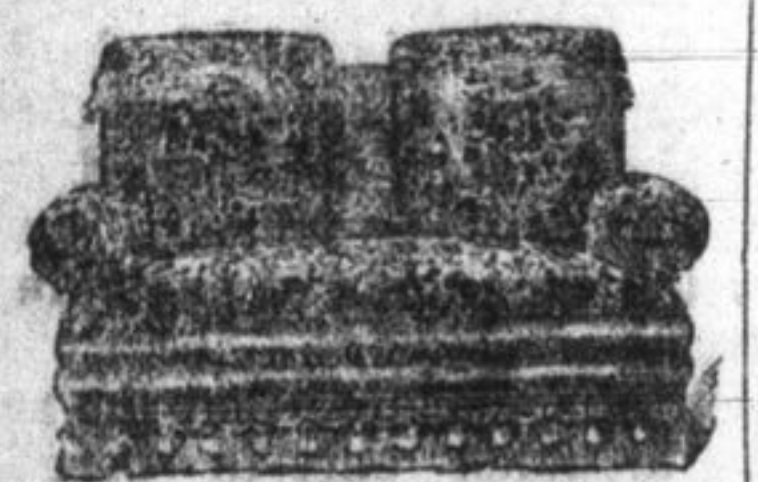

## DEATH OF JOHN SCALLY.

Had Been a Resident of Portsmouth Forty Years.

John Scally, a resident of Portsmouth forty years, died on Friday night, after an illness extending over a month. He was seventy-nine years of age, and was widely known and respected. He occupied the position of assessor for the village, and was an ex-councillor. For twenty years he served as a keeper in the penitentiary, being superannuated in 1893.

Deceased was born at Bush Mills, Antrim, Ireland. He was a Fenian raid veteran, a life-long conservative, an honorary vice-president of the Kingston Liberal-conservative Association and chairman of the Portsmouth association. He is survived by two sons, James and John, of Portsmouth, and four daughters, Miss Maggie, at home; Miss Lizzie, of Rochester, N.Y.; Miss Edith and Mrs. John Priestly, of Calgary.
