## TUESDAY IS LAST DAY QUIET AT CITY HALL

### FOR VOLUNTEERS FOR ACTIVE SERVICE ABROAD.

Many Will be Refused, Owing to Physical Defects—The 14th Regiment Will Have Street Parade This Evening.

To-day is the last day for volunteers to sign up for overseas service. On Monday evening the recruiting officers of the different regiments were kept very busy as a result of a large number of men waiting to the last minute to sign. The recruiting officers of the 47th regiment were particularly busy, as they appeared to be the busiest men in the armouries. Although the men have signed as willing to go abroad, they must pass the medical examination before they leave the city. It is feared that a number of the medical officers are very particular. Applicants' feet are very closely examined.

### 14th Guard Of 120 Men.

At the present time the guard which is doing duty at the Catarqui bridge, wireless station, water-works tower, and the Shipbuilding company's dock is composed of 120 men of the 14th regiment.

On Monday the guard was increased by twenty men. In the course of a week's time a number of these men will leave for foreign service, so their places will have to be taken by others. The officers who are selecting the men for guard duty, are trying not to inconvenience business men by taking their employees, unless the men are anxious to go. It may be that in the course of a few days a number of the members of the regiment may be called to give up their positions and do guard duty for months, providing the two batteries of the R. C. H. A. leave the city.

### Half, or There'll be Trouble.

When the guard on Catarqui bridge says "Half" day, or else, there will be trouble. This is the advice of the officers of the regiment to people who pass over the bridge during the evening. During the past few days the guard has been very much troubled with citizens who refuse to halt when they are told. On Monday evening a well-known citizen attempted to cross the bridge in his automobile. When the guard told him to stop he refused, and made some insulting remarks to the rifleman and drove on. When the guard saw that the man intended to make trouble, he followed the car for a short distance and got the name of the driver and also the number of the car. The matter was reported to headquarters.

### Even Reporters Are Help Up.

A Whig reporter, while making his rounds was stopped at the Kingston Shipbuilding company's gate. He was challenged with the sentence "Where are you going?" The reporter answered "Reporter." He was informed that this magic word had at present no charm on military men, and that he would have to get a pass from "the major" before he could enter the gate.

### 14th Parade This Evening.

A parade of the 14th Regiment has been called for this evening at 7.15 o'clock, at the armouries. The regiment will have a street parade with both bands in attendance. The parade has been called for muster purposes and to keep up the enthusiasm of the men.

### Royal Reserve Men Leave.

The Royal Naval Reserve men in Kingston left on Tuesday morning, on the 1.40 train for Montreal. They were to sail for England on the S.S. Royal Edward at noon Tuesday and transfer to different stations. Those leaving the city were Messrs. Ireland, Adams, Cudling and the two Duan brothers.

### No Order For R. C. H. A.

Lieut.-Col. H. A. Panet, officer in command of the R. C. H. A., when asked by the Whig on Tuesday morning if he had received orders from headquarters for the brigade to report of Quebec at once, stated that he had not heard of any orders for the batteries to move.

### Left For Cartier Plains.

Seven members of the P. A. S. C. left at noon Tuesday for Cartier Plains, Que., to help prepare for the mobilization of the Canadian contingent. The officers were Capt. Greer and Lieut. Adhision.

### Many Were Examined.

A large number of men who have volunteered for the Army Service and engineer corps for overseas service went through the medical examinations at the armouries on Tuesday morning. Some of them were turned down on account of defective feet and legs.

### Sugar Goes Up Again.

At nine o'clock on Tuesday morning, sugar advanced 50¢ a cwt., the price being \$5.15. A local wholesaler in explaining the raise, said there were two reasons. The first was that Germans control the beet-sugar market of the world. The second was that house-wives are buying sugar by the hundred-pound bag and "where there is plenty there is waste."

## DEBENTURES OF \$100 OFFERED FOR SALE.

### And Enquiries Being Made About Them—The War Does Not Stop Kingston Building Operations.

At the city hall these war days, things are as quiet as on a Sunday. The aldermen are on their vacation, so far as civic business is concerned, and there is nothing for the committees to do. The Board of Works' paving schemes have been knocked on the head, owing to the advisability of the council "holding low" and borrowing no more money until the banks "loosen up" somewhat.

The notice inserted in the local newspapers by Mayor Shaw offering for sale city debentures of \$100 and over, bearing interest at five per cent., is bringing inquiries. In some American cities, this \$100 debenture sale has brought in a lot of money, and the mayor is going to try it on Kingston. People who have some money lying idle, can do no better than put it in the debentures of their home city, which are as safe as the Bank of England. The interest is payable half-yearly.

Despite the war times, building operations in Kingston have not been stopped. So far this week, three building permits have been taken out. Lindsay & Co. will put a new front on their newly-acquired property on Princess street, above Wellington; E. Wathen will erect a brick house on the west side of Collingwood street, between Union and King, and Thomas A. Davidson will build a cement brick residence on the east side of Pembroke street, between Division and King streets.

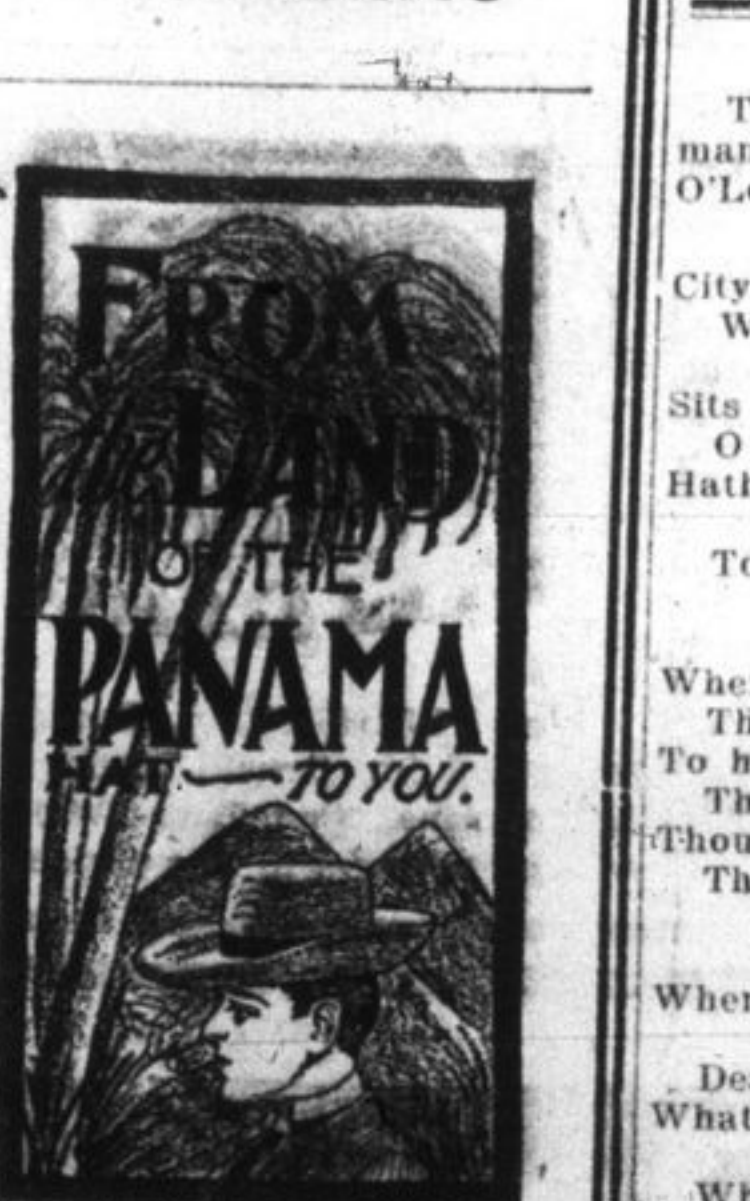

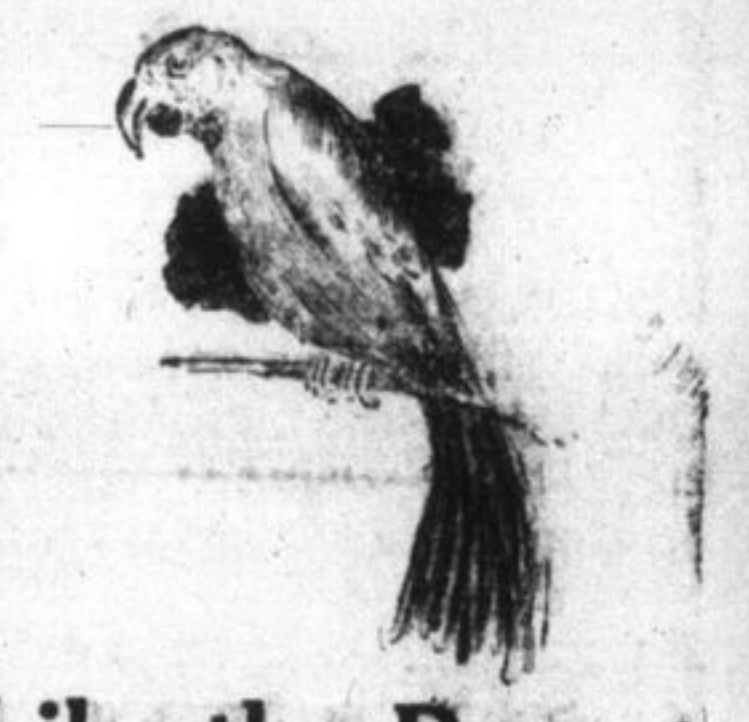
