GERMANS DRIVEN BACK BY THE ALLIED ARMIES

Main Army of Germans Have Been Located.

BIG LOSS INFLECTED

BY FRENCH AND BELGIANS ON THE GERMANS.

A Horde of Peasants Being Used by Germans to Open Routes From Liege to Luxembourg—Austrian Cavalry Brigade Cut to Pieces.

London, Aug. 13.—The official press bureau of the British war office says:

"Of the 25 German army corps the bulk has been located, and it is evident that the mass of German troops is concentrated between Liege and Luxembourg.

"The number of German troops known to be on the western side of that country proves that in the eastern theatre of war the Russo-German frontier, so far as Germany is concerned, is comparatively lightly guarded unless by reservists."

German Forces Repulsed

Brussels, Aug. 13.—That the French troops who are now fighting the Germans in Belgian territory are

winning a decisive victory, is the claim made by the war office in an official statement it is declared that the French are driving the Germans back with loss. The statement makes no mention of the location of the engagement, but announces that several German guns have been captured. The announcement concludes: "The German retirement is becoming more pronounced."

The war office states that the general attack on the Belgian-French centre has failed. The Germans are declared to have retreated all along the line, with the exception of at one point where the fighting continues.

The announcement was accompanied by the statement that the fighting has been serious and the losses heavy.

The war office also announces that the attack of the Germans on the Liege forts had renewed with great vigor. The exchange between the forts and the Germans is said to be very heavy. The fire of the Belgian forts is declared to be hampering the German transports across the River Meuse.

It is stated that the Germans are using a horde of peasants to open the routes southward from Liege toward Luxembourg. The French are massing in great strength before them and the war office believes that an attack in force yesterday of the Germans upon the main Belgian centre was designed as a mask for a main

German advance through Luxembourg to French territory.

One reason for this belief was the report, earlier in the day, and not confirmed, that the Germans had been operating near Clivet on the extreme northern frontier of the department of Ardennes.

Two German Regiments Annihilated

London, Aug. 13.—A Rome despatch to the Central News says the Messagero publishes a message from Basel, Switzerland, stating that two German infantry regiments were annihilated during the battle with the French troops at Mulhausen.

The German regiments mentioned are the 8th Baden Infantry regiment No. 169, which were stationed at Lahr in Baden, and the 4th Prince William's Baden Infantry regiment No. 112, stationed at Mulhausen.

The commander of the 29th division attached to the 14th army corps, whose headquarters were at Freiburg, is said to have been killed.

Austrians Exterminated

London, Aug. 13.—Another despatch from Rome to the Central News says the Corriere D'Italia publishes a telegram from the frontier stating that an Austrian cavalry brigade has been exterminated on the Austro-Russian frontier.

The Austrian cavalry men are said to have attacked the Cossacks, who were accompanied by artillery. They were unable to hold their own and tried to get back across the frontier but rain had fallen and men and horses were caught in the marshy ground and shot down until not a man remained alive.

Bothered By Activity of Japan

London, Aug. 13.—Japan's intervention is highly unwelcome here, revealing the intention to make considerable territorial acquisitions in China and elsewhere in the Pacific. The Times expresses the general feeling when declaring Japan acts on her own initiative and hopes she will, if she moves, limit her action to Kiochau and the sea. "Seizures of German territory elsewhere in the Pacific might lead to grave misunderstanding among our kinsmen and friends and might injure instead of helping our cause."

WAR BULLETINS.

At Rome it is reported that the Montenegrins captured Scutari.

The allied armies repulsed a large German force at Torgres with heavy German loss.

The British admiralty sent out cruisers to protect the Atlantic trade routes.

Russian cruisers, torpedos and submarines are mining the harbor of Vladivostok.

The fight for Liege forts has recommenced. Germans bridged the Meuse. Forts dominate the routes of the Germans, preventing the passage of artillery.

German attack through Belgium having failed, its manoeuvres foreshadow an attempt to force a way to the upper Meuse in France.

It is believed that Germany's fleet is moving out to battle with the British in the North Sea.

No news is forthcoming as to the big land battle now in progress.

Austria and Britain have formally announced a state of war.

Austrian fleet may meet the British-French fleet in a decisive battle in the Mediterranean.

Fifteen Germans in the crew of the steamer Mont Royal were arrested at Montreal.

There are rumors at New York that a naval encounter has taken place off the New England coast, with one vessel sunk.

FOUR GERMANS ARRESTED BY GANANOQUE POLICE

They Had Rifles, Revolvers and Fuse—A Detachment of the 8th Field Battery is Guarding the Town.

Gananoque, Aug. 13.—Four Germans were arrested at the uptown G. T.R. office about 3.30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. They are supposed to have paddled over from Clayton, N.Y., and landed first east of the town and then walked in along the main road. They made enquiry at the ticket office the time of the next train leaving for Brockville and the distance there. Only one could speak English.

Mayor Gibson and Councillor Jones questioned them and Constable Neil placed them under arrest. They are still held in the town cells. John Lee, of the custom house, searched their baggage and found one rifle, two shot guns, two revolvers, a bandolier, a box of antiseptic cotton,

The Ice Problem of Kingston.

Kingston, Aug. 12.—(To the Editor): For weeks the majority of Kingston people have suffered as never before for the want of ice. The reason is the price is prohibitory. SIXTY-five cents for a small block of ice that would not last over night in an ordinary ice chest has compelled hundreds of citizens to resort to other means of keeping food (in cellars) who have never before tried to do so.

Our refrigerators are empty. And what of the awful waste, in milk, for instance, which it is almost impossible to keep sweet without ice in such weather as we have endured the last three weeks.

In one block, where I live, only one home is taking ice. There are eight empty refrigerators this year. This makes the question a vital one. I ask Mayor Shaw: What is he going to do about it? Housekeepers were jubilant when Mayor Shaw suggested the city going into the ice business. Is the subject dead? Cannot our unemployed be used by the city to harvest the ice crop? Is there not some plan, Mr. Mayor, and our Utilities Commission, to relieve the distress and want and give us ice at a reasonable price and profit? I ask these questions in the interest of the housekeepers generally—Very truly, A SUFFERER.
