

TRY TO WRECK EXPRESS

Two Different Attempts Made on the
Wabash.

Windsor, Aug. 13.—Two different at-
tempts to wreck a fast Wabash pas-
senger train near Jarvis, Ont., were
made early yesterday. The Chicago-
New York Flyer, No. 4, in charge of
Conductor Michael Nester, going
through Jarvis at fifty miles an hour,
at four o'clock, struck a pile of ties
placed on the track. The engine
left the rails but the coaches remained
on the track. The passengers were
badly shaken up, but escaped injury.
Wrecking crews were summoned and
the engine put on the track.

Two hours later, at daylight, and
a short distance further along the
track, Wabash Flyer No. 6, in charge
of Conductor Alex McMullen, hit another
obstruction placed on the track,
but the train did not leave the
rails.

Railway officials and the police were
notified, and they in turn notified the
military authorities. An investigation
is being conducted and steps will
be taken to protect the line.

RAFT CANADIAN SANK.

Three Hamilton Men Managed to
Make Land.

Hamilton, Aug. 13.—Word was re-
ceived here from Olcott, N.Y., telling
of the thrilling experience of A. G.
Lees, George Daley, and Ed. B. Fra-
ser, all of this city, on Lake Ontario
on Tuesday night. They left Toron-
to in the thirty-four foot yacht Canadian,
a former Canadian Cup challenger.
When twenty-five miles from the Amer-
ican shore the boat struck something
and sprang a bad leak. The three men
bailed for hours and finally when the boat was 400 yards from
shore it sank. The three exhausted
men barely managed to make land.
They were taken to an hotel at Ol-
cott to receive medical attention.

More Money For Carrying Mail.

Washington, Aug. 12.—A substantial
increase in the compensation paid the
railroads for carrying the mails is
authorized in the Moon bill passed by
the house at the instance of the ad-
ministration. The bill increases rail-
way pay anywhere from two to six
millions of dollars.
