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GUARD AT FORT HENRY

HAS BEEN INCREASED BY 40 MEN OF THE 14TH.

Army Service Corps to Do Duty at Valcartier—How an Artilleryman "Said Good Bye to His Young Wife."

The guard composed of the members of the 14th Regiment, which is doing duty at Barrisfield, was increased by forty on Thursday evening. On Thursday morning Major H. J. Dawson, officer commanding the regiment, ordered all the unmarried men in the regiment to parade at the armouries on Thursday evening at 5.30 o'clock, for the purpose of doing guard duty. The men who went over to Barrisfield last evening, will in all likelihood be placed permanently at the fort, which has been guarded by the members of the R.C.H.A. who left for Valcartier on Thursday evening.

14th Regiment Volunteers.
On Friday morning the men of the 14th Regiment who have volunteered for overseas service, paraded at the armouries and went through some musketry instruction under the direction of Sergt. Ins. Baggalay.

Will R. C. H. A. Go Abroad?
There appears to be doubt as to the R.C.H.A. serving Canada for foreign service. On Friday, when a Whig reporter made inquiries from a military man, he was informed that he was doubtful if the batteries would go abroad. A report has it that the R.C.H.A. has been taken to Valcartier for instructional purposes only, and

C. A. S. C. To Leave.
Major W. A. Mitchell, officer commanding No. 3 company of the Canadian Army Service Corps, received orders on Thursday afternoon for the corps to report at Valcartier at once for the purpose of aiding in the mobilization of the volunteers, who will gather at that point during the next couple of weeks. A large number of the local corps have volunteered for overseas service, but it is not at all likely the corps will cross the ocean. It is not known when the service corps will leave the city.

Queen's Engineering Corps.
Major Alexander MacPhail, officer in command of 5th company of Field Engineers, of Queen's university, when speaking to the Whig on Friday, stated that he expected that his corps would leave in about three days' time for Valcartier.

"Up until the present time it is doubtful what we will be called upon to do," said the commanding officer. "We can depend on about eighty men. Forty of them are students while the others are mechanics of all trades."

In case the corps goes away for foreign service Major MacPhail is the only officer who will go, but in case of home service all the officers will be used.

5th Battery Drilling.
The 5th Field Battery has a number of men in uniform drilling at the armouries. They are under pay. The recruiting in this battery is very promising, as many of the men like this work. There is a shortage of horses and any person who wishes to sell horses should offer them at once.

Train Well Protected.
The C.P.R. train that carried the men and equipment of the R.C.H.A. was well protected. Every sectionman on the line had orders to be on duty until the train passed. They were stationed by their foremen at intervals along the track and were to see that no person was allowed on the right of way.

A section man's gasoline track-car, with two officials, ran ahead of the train. This was to see that no switches were set wrong or that any one had interfered with the track.
