HOSPITAL SHIP DAY

LADIES SOLD TAGS THROUGHOUT THE CITY.

And the People Responded to the Request For Funds For Canada's Hospital Ship Equipment.

"Buy a tag, sir?" was the salutation that greeted the citizens when they came down street on Saturday morning. Then from down into their pocket would come a half-dollar or a quarter or sometimes ten-cent or five-cent bit for the little white tin box with the red-cross on it. Some of the ladies had a Union Jack pinned around their waist to remind people of the Daughters of the Empire. It was surprising how anxious people were to fill that tin box. If some were not, they were soon coaxed by the smiles of the girls.

At first the money came in very fast, but between nine and ten o'clock it quieted down. After this it was a rush for the ladies with their tags. By noon almost every person on the streets was wearing the square of cardboard with the crossed flags in red and the wording I. O. D. E. Hospital Ship Fund.

The ladies, however, even in this good cause, were "turned down" by some people. A farmer and his wife from the Pembroke line told the young ladies that they "never give to charity."

TO SEND 100 NURSES

Ottawa, Aug. 15.—The militia department will send one hundred red cross nurses with the Canadian army division. The selection will be made from several hundred applications which have come in from trained nurses and other young women in all parts of the dominion.

Here's the Explanation.

On Saturday morning a marine man gave a very good solution of the noise which sounded like an aeroplane flying over the city on Thursday evening. He says the steamer "Portland" which is a motor steamer, passed up the harbor on Thursday at 9.50 p.m., the time that the aeroplane was reported. People sitting along the shore would be able to hear her motor working very distinctly. There are lights on the steamer, which would answer to the supposed lights on the aeroplane, and she would be about the same length as the supposed air machine is said to be. After the steamer passed Nine Mile Point there was no more noise.

Saturday Market Prices.

The market on Saturday was a good size. The prices were: Pork, 14c to 16c a lb.; mutton, 22c to 14c a lb.; veal, 19c to 12c a lb.; lamb, 20c to 22c a lb; turkeys, \$1.50 to \$2. each; fowl, \$1. to \$1.50 a pair; chickens, 60c to 90c each; ducks, \$1 to \$1.25 pair; butter 20c to 22c a lb.; eggs, 23c to 25c a dozen; potatoes, \$1.25 to \$1.50 a bushel; apples, \$1. a bushel; tomatoes, \$1. a bushel; huckleberries, \$1.25 a pail; corn at 15c to 18c a dozen.

Picking Up Food Stuffs.

It is reported that agents for commission houses in the United States have been travelling through the eastern part of Ontario and have picked up many thousands of dollars worth of food stuffs, which they are shipping across the line. Canada should very early prohibit the export of food stuffs, as it is likely to be required for home use as well as for Great Britain.

Life Insurance and Soldiers.

The North American Life Assurance company will not charge any extra premium on existing policies, and new insurance will be issued to soldiers doing active duty in Canada at regular rates. Neither Wars Nor Rumors Affect Canadian National Exhibition.
