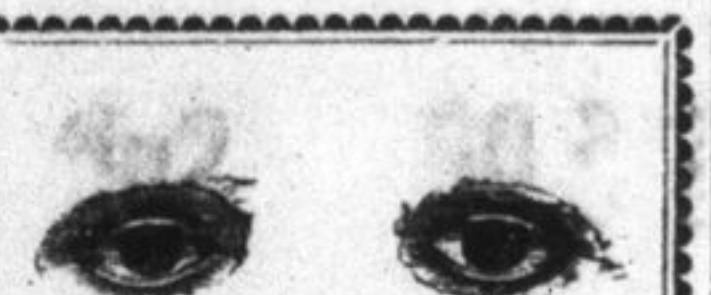

DEATH OF POPE PIUS X

SUPPLICATIONS OFFERED IN ALL ITALIAN CHURCHES.

The Sacred College Summoned to Elect a Successor - Century-Old Precedents Followed At the Time of Death.

Rome, Aug. 20.—In charge of the pontificer, or confessors of the nation, the body of Pope Pius X, to-day, rested in the chamber in which he died Wednesday. Great crowds stood uncovered in St. Peter's square, a thousand knelt in prayer there while, in all the churches, supplications were offered by other thousands who worshipped the venerable head of the church and loved the man for his peasant simplicity.

Cardinal Merry del Val, papal secretary of state, to-day, despatched messages to sixty-six cardinals of the Sacred College, summoning them to Rome for a conclave at which a successor to the late pontiff will be elected.

Every detail of the ceremonies following the death of the pope is covered in century-old precedents, which were followed in the demise of Pius X. In accordance with the prescribed ceremony a lighted candle was held close to the nostrils of the late pontiff. The flame being undisturbed by the slightest exhalation of breath, life was pronounced extinct. The crimson purse containing the ring of St. Peter was then turned over to Cardinal Merry del Val, lord chamberlain. This signified the transfer of authority of the church. The ring was given first by Christ to St. Peter and has been handed down to each succeeding pope, according to traditions.

With the death of the pontiff there began at once the elaborate funeral ceremonies that have followed the death of each pope for centuries past. On the tenth day the body of the pope having been interred, cardinals of the Sacred College will enter conclave. There they are sealed up until a new pope is elected.

Another Bereavement. Rome, Aug. 20.—Catholic hearts are doubly grieved, to-day, when the announcement was made of the death, last night, of Rt. Rev. Father Francesco Saverio Worms, head of the Jesuit Order. As president of the order, Father Worms was frequently referred to as the "Black Pope" because of the enormous power placed in his hands by the Jesuit regulations.

WANT LORD DUNDONALD To Command the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Ottawa, Aug. 20.—There are negotiations in progress looking to the appointment of Lord Dundonald to command the Canadian expeditionary force.

Foreigner On Fire Brigade. There is considerable discussion on the street over a recent appointment to the fire department. Members of the trades and labor organizations claim it is unfair to appoint a foreigner when work is so scarce and many citizens with a stake in the community would gladly take a fire job. Chief Armstrong claims the right to select his force by-law. It is likely the matter will be discussed at the next meeting of the civic fire committee and some policy may be adopted looking to a preference for citizens and taxpayers.

Horse Was Balky. A horse driving a buggy with two men in it, about 5.30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, caused a crowd to gather on Princess street. The horse came west along Montreal street and when it was turned to go up Princess street it stopped. One man got out and tried to coax it to move. Then he whipped it, but the animal would not budge. The horse was at last coaxed by a passer-by to back off the main street, but again it stopped. It almost upset the buggy when another attempt was made to back it. At last a farmer came along and led the horse to a hotel yard.

The Market Prices. There was a good-sized market on Thursday morning, with a big offering of corn, cabbage and apples. Tomatoes were selling at 30c a peck; corn, at 15c a dozen; beans, at 40c a peck; blueberries, at 18c a box; potatoes, 30c a peck; apples, 25c a peck. Cooking apples are scarce this year but the harvest apple crop is good. Butter sold at 30c a lb. and eggs at 27c a dozen.

Can't Ship His Horses. A man from Orillia on Wednesday shipped three race horses to Kingston to be shipped to Watertown, N.Y., for the races there. The customs officials here, however, soon informed him of the fact that there was an embargo on horses and they could not be shipped out of the country. He was very indignant about it but the horses are still in the Whitney hotel yard.

SEEKS TO ESTABLISH

A Hay-Press Factory in Kingston, Maybe.

W. H. Davis, of Durango, Col., arrived Wednesday morning on the early eastern G.T.R. express for a brief visit with his relatives of the Drey Dock company. Mr. Davis is also a brother of Inspector W. H. Davis, of the marine department of the dominion government. Besides the pleasure end of the trip, there is also a business object in seeking to establish somewhere in Canada a manufactory for the Wonder Hay press, a double chamber machine, operating with gasoline or horse power, turning out a large tonnage daily, with minimum of labor cost. These machines are composed principally of steel, and Kingston and vicinity being noted for its great hay production, appears from a glance to be one place favorable for the establishment of the enterprise. One city of western Ontario has already made an offer of land, and other inducements to this company. Mr. Davis will interview the Kingston Board of Trade president while here for his opinion relative to the proposed industry.

POLICE COURT.

A Man on Indian List Was Heavily Fined. James McIlroy, a member of the "prohibited list," charged with being under the influence of liquor while on the list, was called upon to pay a fine of \$25 and costs or one month in jail at the police court on Wednesday morning.

Police Constable R. Sargeant, when called, testified that McIlroy had stated that he would not tell where he got the liquor. The accused stated that he secured the liquor from a man on a train on the way from Kingston Mills, but the magistrate did not put much faith in the story. Two middle-aged men, gathered in on a charge of vagrancy, were given until twelve o'clock to get out of the city. The men were found in a stable at the rear of one of the downtown hotels.

John Crozier pleaded guilty to being drunk and was taxed \$1 and costs or ten days in jail. The fifth case was settled out of court.
